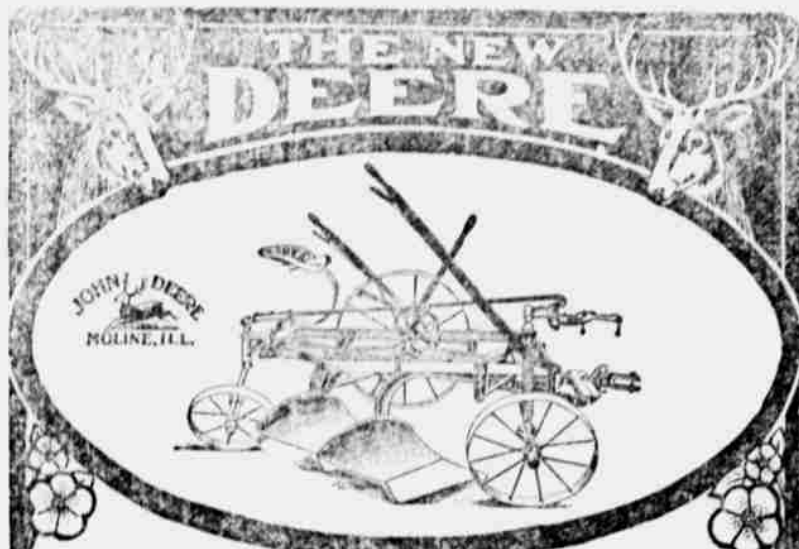
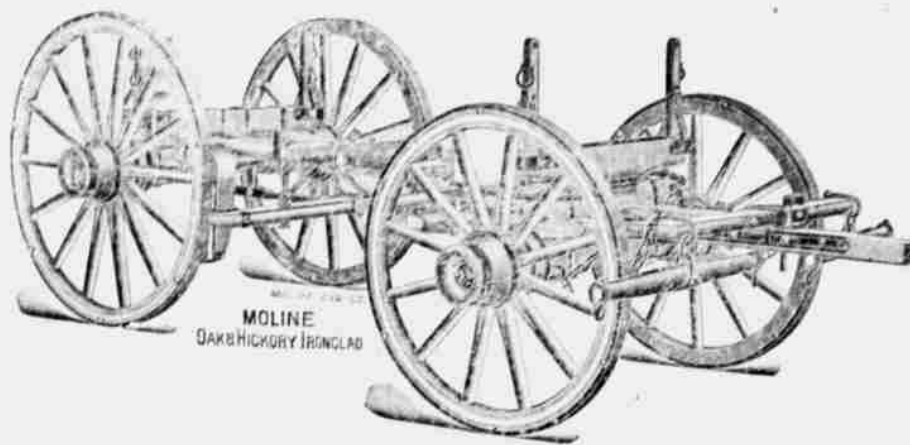

Pheasant Millinery

A discussion having occurred recently in local feminine circles as to whether it was lawful to wear the plumage of Chinese pheasants on millinery, and a study of the game laws of the state failing to settle the question, the matter was referred to State Game Warden W. L. Finley, who replied that "it is not unlawful for persons to wear such plumage as an ornament, provided the birds from which such plumage was taken were killed in accordance with the law."

In view of this decision by Mr. Finley, it is safe to prophesy that the long tail feathers and varied-colored breast plumage of the China cocks will be quite prominent on the head gear of many of the ladies of the community this fall and winter.—Dallas Itemizer.

Appropriation of Water

During the past quarter 150 permits for the appropriation of water have been issued by the State Engineer, of which number 11 are for the construction of reservoirs. According to these permits it is proposed to irrigate 18,690 acres, develop 21,716 horsepower, as well as for municipal and domestic purposes. The construction of the works described in these permits would cost approximately \$2,300,000, of which amount \$550,000 is estimated the cost of constructing reservoirs.

One permit has been issued M. Isopora and Dr. J. Raigala of Amity, in Polk County, during the past quarter. They appropriate the waters of a spring in Sec. 25, Tp 5 S, R 4 W for domestic use.

Sunday Closing Movement Begun

OREGON CITY, Or., Oct. 27.—H. Pierce and O. A. Stoltz, managers of a skating rink at West Linn, may be arrested today because of their failure to obey an order from Constable D. E. Frost to close their place on Sunday. Pierce and Stoltz say they will pay fines, if convicted, and will then file complaints against pool halls and other similar places that keep open Sundays in Oregon City. About 20 places would be affected. When Governor West refused to permit a circus to show in Oregon City on Sunday, it became manifest that an effort would be made, at a favorable time, to make Oregon City a "closed" town on Sunday.
