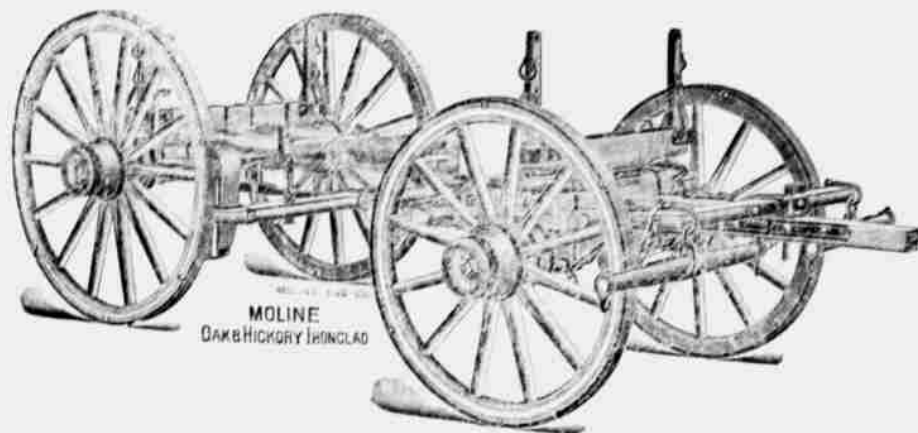

SALEM, Or., Nov. 5.—Despite the fact that this city voted dry at the local option election held here yesterday by a majority of about 487, it seems practically certain now that the fight between the wets and dries will be continued by being shifted from the polls to the courts, for the liquor leaders declared today that they would resist the plans of the dry element to make the city prohibition by December 1, and also declared that it was more than probable that they would contest the election itself.
