GLENDAL, Or., Nov. 5.—This morning about 2 o'clock the safe at the postoffice was blown open by cracksmen and close to \$500 in cash and several hundred dollars' worth of stamps were taken. Postmaster Hurd's insurance papers and other private documents were also stolen by the robbers. The safe was completely wrecked and a bottle with nitro-glycerine left beside the safe, showed how the job was done.

Racing at Ascot.
