The trouble started in a carouse, the Americans being outnumbered. Later the Americans were passing the house where the trouble occurred, and someone fired a shotgun at them. John Kelly was critically wounded, and Bert Wilson and Bert Hill slightly wounded. Bert Johnson was badly beaten. No arrests have been made yet.

Teaches a Love of Birds.

Free to any school in the state: An illustrated lecture on Oregon birds.

As part of an educational policy of teaching boys and girls the habits and economic value of the songsters, the Oregon fish and game commission, in conjunction with the state university, has made this offer. The lecturer is John F. Bovard, professor of zoology at the University of Oregon, and the lectures are well under way. Professor Bovard has appeared at several eastern Oregon towns. On Friday, February 20, he will be at Walterville, and on Friday, February 27, at Woodburn.

Professor Bovard carries a lantern and will give the bird instruction to the children in the daytime where the school room can be darkened sufficiently; if given in the evening, school patrons can be invited.

"We want to save the birds and we want the boys and girls to understand the value of the birds. The talks are free of expense; all that is wanted is the opportunity to present the case," says Professor Bovard.
