Gardening Contests For Oregon Boys and Girls

O. A. C., Corvallis, Ore., Feb. 24.—Project circular No. 1, for the use of Oregon boys and girls in the school garden contests, has been issued by the Extension division of the Agricultural College. It gives the young gardeners concise directions for constructing hotbeds and cold frames and for planting, cultivating and transplanting the vegetables designed for early production.

"Some late maturing plants, such as the tomato, can be grown only by first planting them in hotbeds and later into the field," says the author of the circular, Professor A. G. Bouquet. "Again, from two to six weeks are gained by using the hot beds for such plants as cabbage and cauliflower. It is more satisfactory to grow them in hot beds than to buy the young plants, since hardy plants of the desired varieties can always be secured just when wanted. There is also great satisfaction in doing the preliminary work for one's self."

(The preparation of this circular was rushed in order to provide the children with necessary information early enough to be useful.
