Ordinance, No. 152

An ordinance to provide for the appointment of a pound master and to prescribe for his compensation and to provide for the licensing, and the collection thereof, and the killing, sale and impounding of dogs, and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance and declaring an emergency to exist.

The City Of Monmouth Does Ordain:

Section 1. The City Marshal of the City of Monmouth, Oregon, is hereby appointed pound master of said City to hold said office at the pleasure of the Common Council and of said City.

Section 2. It is hereby declared to be unlawful for any person or persons to keep any dog or dogs within the limits of the City of Monmouth, of the age of more than four months unless the owner or keeper of such dog or dogs shall procure from the City Recorder a license for each dog as in this ordinance provided.

Section 3. The owner or person in charge of any dog kept or owned within the limits of the City of Monmouth, Oregon, shall on or before the 1st day of January in each year pay to the City Recorder of said City the sum of \$2.50 in Gold or Silver Coin for each and every male dog and each spayed female dog, and the sum of \$5.00 for each and every dog or female dog, not so spayed, so owned or kept by him or her, which shall entitle him or her to a receipt from the City Recorder designating the owner's name and number of the license, and said receipt shall be presented to the City Marshal of said City, who shall exchange therefore a license tag bearing the same number as the license receipt. Provided, that any person or persons having dogs kept solely for breeding purposes shall pay a license fee of \$1.00 for each male dog or fe-

male dog so kept, and it shall be unlawful for a dog so licensed to run at large on the streets of said City; and provided further, that a breeder's license shall not issue to any person or persons having less than 25 dogs, and application for such license must be made under oath.

Section 4. For the year 1914, the license fee due under and by virtue of this ordinance shall become due and payable on or before the 1st day of July 1914; and thereafter said license fee shall become due and payable on or before the 1st day of January of each year as above provided.

Section 5. The City Recorder shall keep a suitable record of the licenses granted, and on the expiration of the annual time for issuing licenses, shall give the City Marshal, who, to more fully carry out the provision of this ordinance, is hereby charged with the duties of and given powers of and designated as the poundmaster, a list of the numbers on which licenses have not been paid or renewed, and of the numbers which have not been renewed, and the names of the owners or keepers of dogs bearing such unexpired licenses.

Section 6. Said City Recorder shall pay over to the City Treasurer all moneys collected for licenses under the provisions of this ordinance except that he shall retain 50 cents for each license issued as remuneration for his services and said City Treasurer shall credit such money in the general fund of said city.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the city marshal as poundmaster, and he is hereby authorized to seize, impound, and sell or kill any and all dogs found by him within the limits of the City of Monmouth, Oregon, the owner or owners or keepers of which have failed to procure and pay for a license as provided in section 3 of this ordinance. Upon the taking up and impounding of such animal, the said poundmaster shall post a notice on the city Bulletin Board in front of the City Hall and shall send a similar notice to the owner or keeper of such dog, if the name and address of such owner is known. Such notice shall state that unless the owner of each animal, or other person having an interest therein, shall claim possession of the same and pay all fees and charges of impounding, keeping, or advertising the same, together with the sum due the City for a license, as hereinabove provided, within five days from date of such notice, the poundmaster will proceed to sell the said animal at a time and place therein named, not less than five nor more than seven days from the date thereof, to the highest bidder for cash. Such sales shall be public and be held at the City Pound, and no bid in any case shall be received for any animal for a less sum than the fees and charges of impounding, advertising, keeping, or selling the same, together with an amount sufficient to procure a license upon said animal, if said animal is to be kept within the City of Monmouth, for which last amount the purchaser or owner shall receive a license upon such animal for the current license year. The poundmaster shall be entitled to and may at his discretion charge and collect for impounding dogs a fee not to exceed one dollar, for each dog, either male or female, and for keeping dogs a sum not to exceed 25 cents per day for each dog, and all such fees collected by him shall be 50 per cent retained by him as full compensation for his services in regard to such impounding, selling, etc. In case a sufficient sum is not bid for any such animal to pay all fees, charges and license fee upon the same, the poundmaster may, at his discretion, adjourn said sale from day to day, not more than three days in all, or if no sufficient bid is made for any animal, the poundmaster is hereby empowered and authorized to kill the same and dispose of the carcass thereof, provided further said poundmaster shall pay all expenses of impounding, selling and killing of such dogs, and as an additional compensation receive and retain one-half of said license fee as above provided, that where the poundmaster shall have to kill any dog taken up that he shall have one dollar for each dog killed as remuneration therefor, to be paid out of the general fund.

Section 8. No dog or female dog, in time of heat, or vicious or mad dog shall be permitted to run or be upon the public streets or alleys of the City of Monmouth, whether licensed or not, unless securely muzzled or led by a rope or chain by the owner or keeper thereof, and it shall be lawful for any person to kill such dog so found at large; and the owner or keeper of such dog permitting the same to be at large in violation of the provisions of this section of this ordinance, on conviction thereof in the City Recorder's Court of said City, shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00, or be imprisoned in the City Jail not less than 24 hours nor more than 25 days or both fine and imprisonment.

Section 9. All dogs more than four months old found within the limits of the City of Monmouth, Oregon, without a license tag thereon are hereby declared to be a public nuisance, and any person or inhabitant of said City, who shall keep a dog or dogs within the limits of said City without first having obtained and paid for a license therefor as required by the provisions of this ordinance and having the number thereof stamped or engraved on a collar upon such dog, as hereinbefore provided, or who shall cause or permit a collar and number to be put on a dog with intent to avoid a payment of a license therefor, shall, upon conviction for such offense before the City Recorder of said City, be subject to a fine, not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars, or imprisonment not less than five nor more than twenty five days in the city jail.

Section 10. No person or persons shall hinder or molest any person or persons who may be engaged in seizing any dog, killing or removing the carcass thereof in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, and any person violating this provision of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof in the City Recorder's Court of said City, be fined in a sum not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$50.00, or by imprisonment in the city jail not less than 5 days or more than 25 days.

Section 11. The poundmaster shall make a full report to the Common Council each month of all dogs taken as well as all dogs killed under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 12. It shall be the duty of the poundmaster to make complaint in writing of all violations of this ordinance, and the sum of \$3.00, shall be taxed as costs against the defendant upon every conviction of a violation of this ordinance in addition to a fine or imprisonment.

Section 13. The annual time for issuing license as herein provided, and the time when each and all licenses shall expire shall be on the 1st day of January of each year, and no license shall issue for a less period than one year; provided, however, that the first licenses shall be issued for a less period than one year, which shall be issued on or before the 1st day of July, 1914, provided said license fees shall have been paid as aforesaid, and such license so issued shall expire January 1st, 1915.

Section 14. It shall be the duty of the poundmaster to see that all dogs found within the City of Monmouth, Oregon, are duly licensed and to catch, impound, sell or kill all dogs found in said City which have not been duly licensed; said poundmaster shall provide a suitable pound for all dogs impounded under this ordinance, and shall feed the same, and dispose of the same as hereinbefore provided.

Section 15. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 16. In as much as it is necessary for the public health, peace, and safety of said City and its inhabitants, that this ordinance should become effective at once, an immediate emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the mayor, and the same is hereby excepted from the effects of the referendum.

Section 10. 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A NAVAL COMEDY.

Surrender of the Spanish Gunboat Caliao at Manila.

On the afternoon of the 12th (May 12, 1898) a small Spanish gunboat came steaming up Manila bay, directly toward the American fleet. The surprise of the people in the fleet was great; this little vessel seemed so confident and friendly. Finally one of our ships fired a shot across her bow. This did not seem to make any difference to her, for she kept on just the same. Then we saw an officer go alongside from the flagship.

We found out that evening that this vessel was the Spanish gunboat Caliao and that she had been cruising in the southern part of the Philippines for a long time and had not heard about the war, and the time of her cruise being finished, she was now returning to Manila. The officers and men had been looking forward to this for a long time, because in Manila they were to find their wives, children, parents, friends, theaters, clubs, hotels, newspapers and all the things that make sailors look forward with happiness to getting home. They saw a great many ships in the harbor flying the American flag, but this did not give them any uneasiness, and when the first gun was fired by the American ship they did not notice that the shot came across the bow of their own ship, and thought it was simply the first gun of some salute.

But when the second shot was fired and they heard the whizzing of the shell they knew something was wrong. And when the American officer came on board and told them that every ship in the fleet was destroyed and that they themselves were prisoners of war their feelings of joyful hope went through a change that, let us hope, few of us will ever know.—From Admiral Bradley A.
