## WEEKLY INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

### Oregon Development News In Line of Industries, Payrolls, Products of Labor, Etc

SALEM, ORE., June 8.—At the  
Commonwealth Conference dur-  
ing the past week, held at Eu-  
gene at the State University,  
propositions were made for a  
state employment bureau and in-  
surance against unemployment.

Oregon manufacturers are plan-  
ning an exhibit this fall in con-  
nection with the land show at  
Portland.

Hop contracts for the 1915 crop  
are being made at sixteen cents.

W. N. Turner and E. N. Booth  
of Eugene will erect a large can-  
nery at McMinnville.

R. H. Clow is building a hydro-  
electric plant at Mapleton.

The Union Oil Co. of California  
is establishing distributing plants  
at many cities in Oregon.

During May, 72 vessels cleared  
from the mouth of the Columbia  
with 70,684,615 ft. of lumber,  
against 39 vessels with lumber in  
May, 1913.

Shaniko shipped 122 double-  
deck cars of sheep the last week  
of May.

The Hill railroad will build its  
industrial tracks up Sullivan's  
gulch in Portland before July 1st.

Over 100 carloads of machinery  
went into the new fireproof saw-  
mill at Springfield that will be  
operated entirely by electric  
power.

The law fixing the minimum  
wage for girls and women in  
Oregon at \$8.64 is on trial before  
the Supreme court of the United  
States.

The new Medford cannery is  
to be ready for work June 15th.

Work on the new \$30,000 Y.  
M. C. A. building at Astoria will  
start July 15.

The steel for the new court  
house and county jail at The  
Dalles is being shipped in from  
St. Louis, when steel plants in  
Oregon are idle.

Manufacturers met at Eugene  
Thursday night and discussed the  
vicious features of the working-  
men's compensation act which  
they seek to have amended be-  
fore manufacturing can boom in  
Oregon.

Many new roads are being built  
in and around Crater Lake.

The Cottage Grove cannery has  
an order for a carload of goose-  
berries.

St. Johns public docks that  
have cost the city \$5,000 a year  
to maintain and have been rented  
to a paper company for \$2400 a  
year, will be sold.

Eugene is paving many streets  
with the Clark-Henry pavement,  
and all the other streets which  
are bitulithic are being re-sur-  
faced.

Speakers at the Woman's Com-  
monwealth Conference advocated  
raising the age of employment  
from sixteen to seventeen years.

Farmers and Fruit Growers  
generally are failing to get can-  
nery contracts on account of the  
minimum wage and eight hour  
law applying to the fruit industry  
which is not the case in Cali-  
fornia.

Gresham is to have a jelly  
factory.

It is variously estimated that  
the new boards and commissions  
proposed at the Eugene Common-  
wealth Conference would cost  
the taxpayers at least \$100,000 a  
year.

At the Union county stock  
show last week \$200,000 worth  
of fine stock was shown in daily  
parade.

Senator Chamberlain was in-  
strumental in securing \$4,000,000  
in appropriations for the Colum-  
bia in the Rivers' and Harbors'  
bill.

The southern Oregon and  
northern California mining con-  
gress meets at Ashland, July 9  
and 10.

Carleton will expend \$50,000  
on paving this year.

The Newberg cannery run on

To John M. Stone and Mary E. Stone,  
his wife, above named defendants:  
IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF  
OREGON: You are hereby required to  
appear and answer the complaint filed  
against you in the above entitled court  
and suit, within six weeks from the  
date of first publication of this sum-  
mons, to-wit: on or before the 15th day  
of June, 1914, and if you fail so to  
answer for want thereof the plaintiff  
will apply to said court for the relief  
demanded in his said complaint, to-wit:  
for a judgment against you in the sum  
of \$4,030.00, with interest thereon from  
Sept. 12th, 1913, at the rate of 7 per  
cent per annum until paid, for the sum  
of \$114.76 insurance premiums, for  
\$250.00 attorney's fees and for his costs  
and disbursements in said suit; that the  
usual decree may be made for the sale
