One hundred and ten thousand signatures have been procured for the proposed initiative state-wide prohibition bill in Washington. The petition will be filed on July 1. Only 32,000 signatures were required to put the question on the ballot. It would be necessary to poll only 55,000 more votes than the 110,000 signatures in order to reasonably insure the passage of state-wide prohibition.
