Yacht Regatta at Exposition

Emperor William of Germany has announced that he will give a cup to the winner of the Sonder class event in the yacht regatta of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. The cup will be engraved as follows: "Presented by His Imperial Majesty Wilhelm II, Emperor of Germany, to the winner of the Sonderklasse Race held under the auspices of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, April, 1915." President Woodrow Wilson and King George V have offered cups for two other events of the regatta. The races will be held in San Francisco harbor.

Millstone Production in 1913

The production of millstones and related quarry products—burrstones, chasers and drag stones—in the United States in 1913 amounted to \$56,163 in value, a decrease of \$15,251 compared with the value in 1912. The production of millstones in this country in 1913 was nevertheless larger than in all but three years since 1888, when it was valued at \$81,000. Millstones were produced in 1913 in Alabama, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Virginia.
