DAY NAMED TO PRAY FOR END OF WAR

Rev. C. F. McPherson of Clatskanie Urges World-wide Supplication

CLATSKANIE, Oregon, Aug. 17. —Rev. Chas. T. McPherson, pastor of the Methodist church here, gave a few minutes' time of the morning service yesterday morning to a discussion of the European wars. He said in part, that while the greatest conflict of the world might be imminent, there was somewhere a force sufficient to put a stop to it.

"Oftentimes, when it seems there is no power available to stop an evil force such a power may be within our grasp," he said. "I believe God's hands are holding the reins of the government of the earth. However, he expects his people to take a hand in promoting peace."

He read the following resolution which was unanimously adopted by the congregation:

"Whereas the world is now arrayed in deadly conflict without sufficient cause, and it now appears that the situation is beyond human control or interference, and that only by the interposition of divine power it may be softened and tempered with peace on earth and good will to men, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the Christian people of the world unite in one unanimous supplication, in earnest prayer, to Almighty God for immediate interference in bringing permanent peace and the disarmament of all warring forces of all nations; and that for such purpose, Sunday, August 23, 1914, be set apart as a day of prayer; and that the Christian people of all Christendom observe it in the churches and homes, the fields, or

the workshops, or wherever they may be; also that the priests, ministers and clergymen of all churches throughout the world, upon the above mentioned day, use their best efforts in appeals, in bringing about results herein prayed for; further be it

"Resolved, That the press of the countries of the earth be requested to give this appeal wide publicity."
