Some Fair Awards

Our space gave out last week before we got to the State Fair awards. This week we will give what we can gather of those belonging to Monmouth and vicinity.

On Jersey cattle C. P. Hem-bree's lot was awarded the following prizes: Fourth on aged bull; second and third on yearling; first and fourth on senior calf, and first and fourth on junior calf.

On cows: Aged cow, first; on three-year-old, first; fifth on two-year-old; second on senior yearling; first on junior yearling; first on senior calf and fourth on junior calf.

On herds: First on aged herds; first on young herds; first on calf herd; first on breeding herd, and first and second on get of sire.

Junior champion bull and junior and senior and grand champion on cow.

Aged bull, Frank Laughary, second; two-year-old, G. G. Hewitt, second; one-year-old G. G. Hewitt, fifth. Junior calf, Laughary, second.

Aged cows: G. G. Hewitt, second and fourth; Laughary, fifth; two-year-old, Laughary, first, Hewitt, third; senior yearling heifer, Hewitt, first, Laughary, fifth; calf, Laughary, third and Hewitt fourth and fifth.

Graded herd, Laughary, third. Breders young herd, Laughary, second and second on calf herd, and first and second on produce of one cow.

On Southdown and Lincoln sheep, Riddell & Sons were awarded a very large share of the prizes.

Poor Economy

"We are apt to lose sight of the importance of putting our children in their young, impressionable years under competent teachers, under trainers who know how to train. This state spends over \$5,250,000 annually on its common schools. What could be poorer economy than to spend this vast sum under teachers who are inefficient?"

"As Dean Proctor of Pacific University at Forest Grove puts it, 'We know that by putting in to the common schools the normal trained teacher, who will inspire the children under her with higher ideals and ambitions, because she has been trained for just that work and knows how, the colleges like ours will grow and prosper as a matter of course.'

"This consideration is leading all those who have the educational interests of the state at heart to work for more normal school trained teachers. It is one of the crying needs of the state. The people of our section of the state are practically a unit behind the effort to reopen the Southern Oregon State Normal up at Ashland. They have been driven to it by their inability to get trained teachers in their schools."
