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REGULAR PORTLAND LETTER

Central By-Products Association Will Hold Meeting

APPROPRIATION WILL EXPIRE DEC. 31

Oregon Agricultural College Will Establish Bureau of Organization and Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 26.—A call for a meeting of the Central By-Products Association has been issued by the Chairman, H. C. Sampson and J. F. Batchelder, secretary of the By-Products of the National Apple Show. This meeting will be held at Spokane at 10 a. m. on November 19, in connection with the 7th annual apple show. The investigating committee which was appointed at the conference held at Portland some weeks ago is unanimous in its belief that there will be an outlet for all the by-products that can be produced in the fruit section of the Northwest and at the coming conference the committee will report its findings and make suggestions as to future action.

All growers' associations are entitled to representation at the coming convention as also are commercial organizations that have given the preliminary plan financial aid.

Secretary Franklin R. Lane has advised Governor West that the reclamation service engineers have decided upon the Deschutes project as the most suitable one in this state upon which to expend the \$450,000 allotted by the government for reclamation work in Oregon. This appropriation was made for expenditure during the calendar year of 1914 and was made dependent upon the appropriation of a similar amount by the state of Oregon. Unless the money from the state is forthcoming the government appropriation will expire on December 31, but it may be renewed immediately for the first of the next year.

Whether or not Crook County is to be divided up into two or three counties will be decided at the coming election. There is a proposition to take off a part of the present county to be called Deschutes County and another part to be called Jefferson County. If the division is made at this time the two new counties will start life with few inhabitants but entirely free from debt.

Of great interest to Portland and incidentally to the entire state was the visit last Friday of the traveling passenger agents of the Canadian Pacific Railroad, when they were entertained by the Portland Commercial Club. These men are looking over the territory preliminary to fixing their rates for the tourist travel to the coast next year. Every passenger going to the San Francisco Exposition by way of the Canadian road will pass through Oregon and it is hoped that a large percentage of them may be induced to remain for some little time in the state.

The Board of Regents of the

Oregon Agricultural College has instructed President Kerr of that institution to establish under the direction of the department of Agricultural Economics a Bureau of Organization and Markets. This bureau will inaugurate a systematic publicity campaign on the whole subject of marketing farm products, packing, shipping, selling and other details, and will co-operate with farmers' organizations and associations of consumers in making the most effective use of all modern means of disposing of farm produce.

Senator Chamberlain Here

Hon. George E. Chamberlain was here Wednesday forenoon and talked to a good assembly of Monmouth citizens for about an hour.

His address touched mostly on the measures inaugurated by the present administration, giving his audience an insight into the workings and purposes of the measures and the reasons for their enactment.

His address was well received and was interspersed here and there with hearty applause, and we are of the opinion that Mr. Chamberlain will receive liberal support from this section and that Oregon could do worse than to send him back to Washington for another term.

Joker is Killed By His Best Boyhood Friend

SALEM, Or., Oct. 26.—Robert Matzke, who was shot near Dallas yesterday morning by Edward F. Brown, under the impression that he was a burglar, died at a local hospital here within nine hours after the tragedy. The two had been lifelong friends, and Brown is prostrated with grief.

The tragedy occurred at the Brown farm, located eight miles from this city, on the Dallas road. The two had been boyhood friends in Wisconsin, and ever since Matzke came here, 21-2 years ago, he had been a frequent visitor at the Brown home, it is said even having been provided with a key to the house.

Saturday evening he and several friends motored to Dallas, and on returning at 1:30 o'clock in the morning he decided to stop at the home of his friend, and visit for a few minutes. Accordingly he left his companions in the machine on the road and entered the Brown home with the key. His entrance awoke Brown, who had retired, and he is said to have inquired, "Who is there?" Matzke, evidently thinking that his friend would recognize his voice, is said to have answered, "A burglar."

Brown is then said to have seized a shotgun and, stepping into the room where Matzke was, he again asked, "Who is there?"

"A burglar; throw up your hands," is said to have been Matzke's reply. Taking aim at the form Brown was able to make out in the darkness, he fired, hitting Matzke in the head.

Dr. W. B. Morse of this city, was summoned, and Matzke was brought to a local hospital, but he was beyond medical aid. He was single and was identified with a garage here. Brown is married and has several children.

The opening number of the course is a lecture, "Mexico Today," by Frederick Starr of the University of Chicago. Frederick Starr is an author of note who has had actual living experience among the Mexicans. Professor Starr has made a special study of races of various types and the conditions in which they live. Much of this intensely interesting material he has incorporated in book form. He is celebrated not only in his own country, but also abroad since he has received numerous orders and decorations of honor from Holland, France and Italy in recognition of his services and contributions to science. Pres. Ackerman returned Tuesday from Baker City where he attended the Oregon State Teachers' Association, Eastern Division, and reports a most enthusiastic and profitable meeting. Mr. Gentle and Miss Cohoon lectured during the three days of the Marion County Institute which was held in Salem Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week.

On Saturday afternoon the girls of the Y. W. C. A. entertained for Miss Fox at the home of Miss Taylor.

Friday morning Miss Myra H. Butler of the Domestic Science Department gave a very practical talk on "Meats and How to Buy Them." Miss Butler, by the use of a chart showed the location of the various cuts of meat and explained why each cut was valuable for certain purposes. By means of further illustrations with slides, good cuts of various kinds of meat were thrown on the screen as practical aids to buying. With all this, Miss Butler included some directions as to cooking and serving, as well as means of dealing with butchers. Knowledge of this sort ought to be more widely distributed since it deals with a living problem and the students who heard Miss Butler ought to be prepared to spread the information further

in their schools. Miss Butler was enthusiastically cheered by the students.

Following Miss Butler was Miss Marie Hofer, who has been giving a series of talks in connection with recreation problems, spoke on "The Festival and Pageant." Miss Hofer's purpose was to outline what might be done in any community by the teacher who could use material at hand to work out effective programs embodying the life of the school and community. Miss Hofer developed this problem at some length by means of numerous illustrations and examples.

Last Friday evening the Vespertine Society held its regular meeting. After the joint program to which the Vespertines contributed a clever song dramatization and a whistling solo, the society took up its regular session. A scene from "Zenobia," by William Ware was given with good effect. Miss Pursifall, who took the part of "Aureliu" and Miss Baird who was "Zenobia," were principal characters. The tableau grouping and oriental costumes were attractive.

Monday morning, Miss Fox, Field Secretary of the North West for the Y. W. C. A., spoke in chapel. Miss Fox told particularly of work done in New York on the east side among the poor children. Some of the incidents she relates were pathetic stories of foreign children to whom the workers of the Y. W. C. A. were trying to bring some of the wholesome joys of childhood. Miss Fox, by her message, and her personality brings always some new cheer to her audience.

The very gratifying news was received this week that Governor West had appointed Mr. E. E. Bragg, of La Grande, as a member of the Board of Regents to take the place of Judge Jewell, deceased. Mr. Bragg's great interest in the public school system of the State, and his former efficient efforts in the school's behalf while a member of the Board of Regents, bespeaks much for the good of the School.
