Clover Seed to Virginia

A Herald representative visited the warehouse here yesterday and found Messrs. John Riddell and Fred Smith preparing clover seed for shipment to Richmond, Virginia. This is the second carload that has been shipped from here for that destination and makes the fourth from the Oregon Milling & Warehouse Company of this place and Independence for this season.

The seed is double sacked and is shipped from here to Portland where it is put aboard a steamship which takes it through the Panama canal to its destination. Mr. Riddell remarked that the clover seed crop was short here last season, otherwise there would have been about ten carloads instead of two from this place.

There are fifteen tons to the car and this shipment will clean up most of the seed in this section.

Better Light For The City

The Oregon Power Company has a force of men at work installing the new lighting system for Monmouth. A. L. Martin, the local manager, was here last Tuesday and from him we learned that the work of installation would be completed in a couple of weeks providing there is no delay in getting the necessary material on the ground.
