Boy Scout Notes

The Scout Master recently received his commission at national headquarters in New York City. His number is 18574, Scout Master of Monmouth, Troop No. 1. This commission lasts for the period of one year. All the business of the troop is done according to the National Council at New York City.

A constitutional committee composed of Earl Williams, chairman, Hugh Bell and Max Bowersen met with the Scout Master the past week and together formulated a constitution and by-laws for the troop. It will be voted on at our next meeting by the boys. One of the provisions requires a new applicant's name to be voted on favorably by two-thirds of the members of the troop.

The membership cards of the troop were received during the past week. They are a celluloid back booklet, containing the name, troop and patrol of the member. It also contains the Scout oath and laws and the international code.

The troop has at the present time 12 members. Several applications are before the committee on new members.

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
