A Scout Trip

The twentieth day of February will long be remembered by the Monmouth Scouts as the day when, filled with the life stories of two of the greatest American Scouts, Washington and Lincoln, we made a trip to "Long Ridge Mountain" across the Willamette river from Independence.

We were never so happy in our lives, we believe, as the time when our Scoutmaster promised us that if the weather was willing, the Scouts would make a trip on the following Saturday to "Long Ridge Mountain." We had often wished to go to it, because most of us have lived here all of our lives and we didn't know much about it.

Although the weather did not prove to be up to the standard set by our Scoutmaster, he, after delaying a half hour, at last consented to let us go. We were so glad, not we were on our way. We had our dinners with us, most of the Scouts bringing along something to cook.

We arrived at Independence at 9:55. We went down by the rock crusher and observed it working. Then we crossed on the ferry. Remembering the words of our Scoutmaster in his final directions, "Keep your eyes open and learn of things of nature, besides merely making a hike," we tried to do so. Patrol Leader Moore led us on our hike while our Scoutmaster brought up the rear. Twelve Scouts enjoyed the morning air. We noticed that a cloud was settling over the mountain. We journeyed on and soon arrived at East Independence Station on the Oregon Electric line. Here our climb began and here also began our fun. One of the Scouts who had not made so many hikes professed to be

weary, claiming he was hindered by too many fat cells. However, he kept up with us. We found coal laying on top of the ground showing there was a deposit of coal there. We found a mountain spring. We found ourselves after a few minutes walk, half way up the mountain and all around us fir and ash trees. We made our campfire in a small grove of trees which protected us from the little rain that fell. Several of the Scouts improvised an old stack pipe for our fire. After dinner, two Scouts preferred to remain in camp to build a lean-to, the other Scouts and Scoutmaster going on further up the hill to what is called the "Pinacle." We found some very large trees; it took six Scouts to reach around one tree. We found several large cave-ins. We noticed many mountain laurels beginning to leaf. Our Scoutmaster found an old deer horn and two Scouts declared they found fresh deer tracks. We got several souvenirs, not as reminders but as remembrances. Then we traveled home, stopping on the way to look at the Oregon Electric Company's power house. And going home six Scouts and the Scoutmaster for a time lost their way. We arrived home later than we had intended, but felt justified because we had learned so much. We like to take hikes when we learn something and hope to make many more in the future.
