Payroll of 13,000 Men

Nearly \$20,000,000 was expended by the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Co. in the states of Washington, Oregon and Idaho during the year 1914, according to figures just compiled. The exact amount is \$19,735,803.75. The statement further shows that more than 13,000 persons are dependent on the operation of the Union Pacific system in the Northwest. For the year ending June 30, 1914, the O. W. R. & N. paid \$1,390,698.65 in taxes. In the three states \$5,042,425.71 was spent in the construction of new lines.

Apples Not The Only Resource

While Hood River's great claim to fame may now be her apples and other fruit, a recent publication of the United States Geological Survey indicates that she has other resources of great importance. This publication is Water-Supply Paper 348, "Profile Surveys in Hood and Sandy River Basins, Oregon," prepared in co-operation with John H. Lewis, State engineer of Oregon.

This paper gives, in addition to a general description of Hood and Sandy River basins, plans and profiles of these two streams, which derive their flow from the melting snows and glaciers of Mount Hood. A part of the water power on these rivers has already been developed, and a study of this paper shows that there is opportunity for further utilization.

Normal Student Wins Suit Against School District

Frank Brumbaugh of this city, who is now attending Monmouth Normal, was given a verdict by a jury in the circuit court Friday against school district No. 31, at Blue Mountain, for alleged breach of contract. He sued the district for nine months' salary at \$70 a month and was awarded the full amount asked for, which was \$630.

Brumbaugh claimed that the school board engaged him to teach the school but that he was not allowed to enter upon his duties, another teacher having been hired subsequently.

The testimony showed that one board intended to employ him and that a contract was entered into but when the board changed at the next election the new directors declined to employ him on the ground that he was not qualified to teach the high school grades. — Cottage Grove Sentinel.
