PORTLAND, ORE., March 27.—The beauties of Oregon so impressed Mrs. Lynette Arnold Henderson, of Sioux City, Iowa, that she recently put these impressions into words and these words are the lyrics for the 1915 Rose Festival song. Mrs. Henderson donated the lyrics and John C. Abbett, well known railroad man and musician of Portland wrote the music. The song has a fine catchy swing to it which the whole state will soon be whistling.

Through the courtesy of A. H. Eilers, well known music dealer of Portland, the festival song will be given wide spread circulation. Copies will be sent to glee clubs, orchestras, bands and singing societies of the state and efforts will be made to make "The Whole World Knows the Portland Rose," the song hit of the year.

Forest Notes

Although much is said regarding the "increased cost of living," it is noted that lumber is cheaper than it was ten years ago.

Portland, Oregon, is the largest lumber manufacturing city in the world.

In spite of the low rates charged for the use of the Forests, the Tongass National Forest is self-supporting almost twice over. Twenty-five percent of this income reverts to the Territory for schools and roads.

It is estimated that there is a stand of thirty billion feet of western hemlock in Washington and twenty billion feet in Oregon. Of the amount of this species used in Washington, 83 percent is made into box shooks; of the amount used in Oregon, 75 percent is converted into pulpwood.

The latest figures show that the State of Washington produced 65 percent of all the shingles manufactured in the country during the year, the wood used being western red cedar.

The last report, issued by the Government, upon the vacant public lands of the United States, shows that the area unappropriated and unreserved covers a total of 665,891,029 acres, of which 486,686,632 acres is unsurveyed. Of this latter figure, 387,963,829 acres represents vacant lands in Alaska.

Nine hundred coyote pelts were submitted to the Lincoln County (Wyoming) Woolgrowers' Association, at its recent meeting, for the bounty of \$2.50 apiece, offered by the Association.

An association has just been formed by stockmen located in and around the Crater National Forest in southern Oregon. This organization, known as the South Butte Cattle and Horse Association, has been officially recognized by the district forester, and has for its main object the economical and beneficial handling of the stock and range within the National Forest.

Stockmen using the government range have constructed, to date, approximately 185 miles of drift fence in Washington and Oregon, to prevent the cattle and horses from drifting onto the sheep range.
