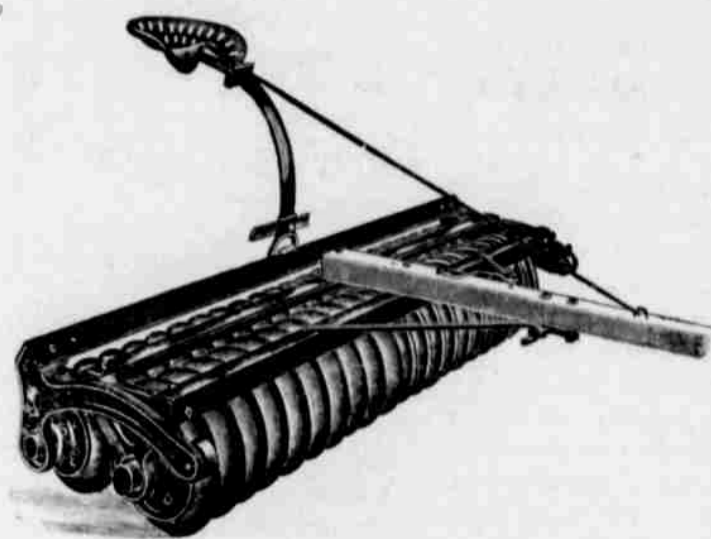

C. and Tom Boylen of the University of Oregon, to give personal advice and instruction to those who entered the meet.
