Some Weather

During the past week the weather has been very changable at least in this section. On Thursday of last week there was a strong wind from the Northwest that lowered the temperature and had a blighting effect on vegetation, but the chief damage was done by the heavy frost Thursday night so that in some places most of the fruit was killed while in others, according to report, the damage was not nearly so great.

The prune crop seems to have been hit quite hard and so far as we have learned there will be but a very short crop.

Some claim that their cherries escaped to a considerable extent, but it appears that the fruit crop generally in this section will be short.

English walnuts received considerable damage to the foliage and the fruit crop is also damaged. Saturday and Sunday brought better weather, although there was snow on the mountains west of here on Sunday. Monday brought warm weather with a very heavy rain in the evening, with hail south of Monmouth and to the eastward. The rain was welcomed by all except perhaps by those caught out without proper wraps and as the Junior class of the Normal had gone to the Luckiamute to picnic, there being about seventy of them, they got a full benefit and all were thoroughly drenched. Warmer weather has prevailed since Monday.
