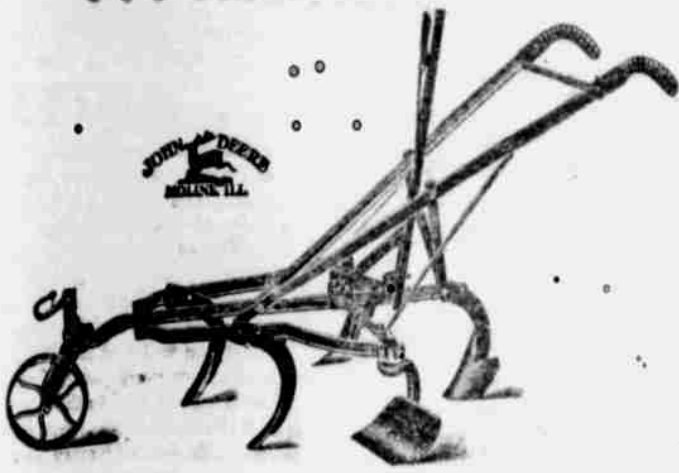
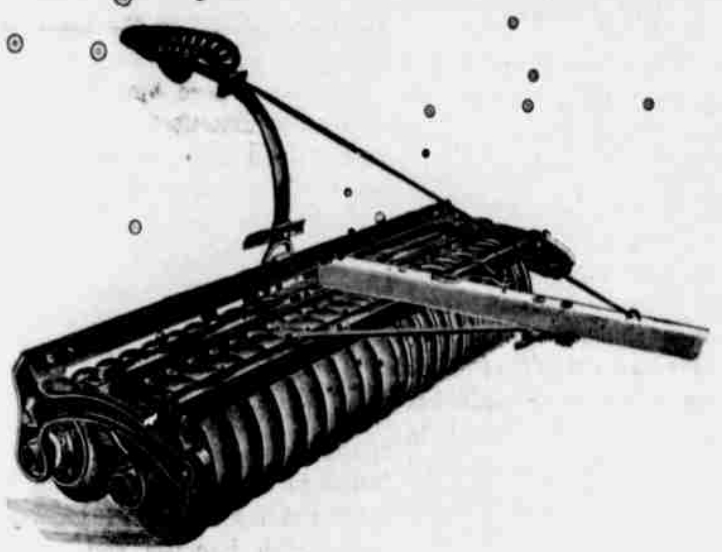

### STILL LIKES MONMOUTH.

The following letter from a former resident speaks for itself:

GIBSONBURG, Ohio, May, 18, 1915

Mr. D. E. Stitt,  
Monmouth, Oregon.

Dear Sir and Friend:

I am enclosing herewith a check in payment for the HERALD. While the personal of Monmouth has changed greatly since we moved away four years ago, there are still many familiar names appearing in the news items of the HERALD which make it a much appreciated visitor to our home.

Nothing would give us greater pleasure than an opportunity to step into your office and into the homes of old Monmouth friends again. I must confess to an occasional feeling of "homesickness."

We, in Ohio, enjoyed (?) a long severe winter, and are having a cold dry spring.

It has been raining some during the past two days, but is very cold and disagreeable.

The past year has been a strenuous one for us. We have just completed a beautiful new church at a cost of \$16,000.00 and improvements to about \$1,000.00 were made on the parsonage.

The church was dedicated on May the 2nd. The building is constructed of Red Rugdale fire-clay brick, with Bedford sandstone trimming. The interior is finished in oak, the side wall and ceiling painted in water colors. The lighting system is the most modern semi-indirect electric. Tubular furnaces with fan and motor take care of the heating and ventilating. The interior arrangement is such that nearly all Sunday school classes have separate apartments which can

be opened into the main auditorium which together with a large balcony will seat about 600 people.

We have an ideal location, just one block from the city square on the main street.

Last Sunday was a big day both in the church and Sunday school. The attendance in S. S. (159) was more than double what it was one year ago.

At the conclusion of the preaching service we received 28 persons into church membership, and baptized 9.

### HAS POLK RADIUM MINE

Pitchblende Thought to Have Been Discovered Here

What is believed to be a large deposit of pitchblende, from which radium is derived, has been found on the John Ritter farm south of Dallas. While ditching on the place some weeks ago J. W. Elliott a neighbor and a pioneer of Polk county, struck a substance that resembled tar and was so sticky that it was with difficulty that he cleaned it from his spade. Samples of the dirt were sent to the state agricultural college at Corvallis, to the government assay offices at Seattle and Denver and to the bureau of mines at Washington, D. C. In each case replies were received that the samples were undoubtedly pitchblende, but that there was not enough of it to determine whether or not it contained radium. Mr. Elliott and Mr. Ritter have traced the vein for more than a mile.—Observer.
