WEEKLY INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

New Payrolls, Improvements and Factories and Enterprises that Will Give Labor Employment, and Matters Affecting Industries and Investments.

SALEM, OREGON, June 14.—Interstate Commerce Commission rules S. P. Company cannot put on fleet of oil steamers for coast service. Dearer road oil and fuel oil will result.

Oregon voters are refusing to sign petitions to initiate bills for single tax and to abolish legislature.

Eugene—Pacific Telephone Co. will expend \$15,000 on two-wire line to Florence.

Portland—Studebaker Company will build a branch plant to cost \$90,000.

Sparta—Homesteaders on 320 acre tracts reducing sheep range 32,000 acres.

Joney regulation was sustained by Portland voters.

Chas. M. Miller of Portland will manufacture fruit evaporators at Albany.

Eugene fruit evaporator has order for 20,000 pounds dried logan berries.

Northern Pacific and Great

Northern are preparing to operate direct trains from Seattle to Flavel via Kalama and Rainier to connect with San Francisco steamers.

All the S. P. Company properties in Oregon have now one head—D. W. Campbell.

Baker County has abolished office of county school supervisor.

Astorian—The reason for the almost general suspension of railroad dividends might be accounted for by the increased cost of regulation. The interstate commerce commission in one year asked for and received 11,000 reports from the Pennsylvania railroad company. The commission did not pay the cost of getting out the reports.

Baker county is producing \$200,000 gold per month.

Salem—Clerical force in State Engineer's office ordered reduced.

Portland Chamber of Commerce favors Warrenite for hard surface county roads.

Latest statistics show 4,000,000 pounds cheese output in Tillamook county the past year.

U'Ren's latest idea is to loan one-third of state taxes to the people.

The district-aided railroad campaign of 1909 is building railroads at Grants Pass and Roseburg.

Ben Hostetter, Silverton, got Stayton school contract at \$14,000—brick.

Brownsville has made seven efforts to pave and is trying again.

St. Helens cannery will handle five tons of beans daily.

Salem printers union say state printing elementary textbooks would save \$75,000 a year.

State publishing long array of industrial accidents each week discourages industry.

Newberg cannery is putting strawberries in barrels for confectionery use.

Portland building ordinance put embargo on improvements.

Industrial accident commission had \$327,364 on hand May 31. This is idle money taken out of industries and from laborers to carry on state accident insurance.

Portland heights may get a \$200,000 apartment house.

The annual bill for being governed must be paid. The less government we have the less the bill will be and the better grade of government we get. Dr. Lyman Abbott is the latest convert to this theory and he says we have too much government.

Seaside Union high school to cost \$37,000.
