### The Training School Building

The \$50,000 Training School building ordered erected at Monmouth by the Board of Regents at their annual meeting held during the past week will be the second building to go up there entirely of Oregon material in construction and equipment. A resolution was adopted that if erected of brick, as it will be, the facings and finishings shall be of Oregon stone. It is probable that the building committee will use granite in the entrance and sandstone for the caps and sills and water tables. These are small matters but are of the utmost practical importance in the development of the languishing Oregon stone industry.—Oregon Voter.

## Death Camas

The Department of Agriculture has just issued a bulletin (No. 125) upon "Zygadenus or Death Camas." This bulletin will doubtless be of interest to those who have recently suffered losses due to the poisoning of their stock caused by the eating of this plant.

According to this publication, the death camas is found throughout the United States, and as far north as Alaska; but it is most abundant from the Rocky Mountains west to the Pacific Ocean. The plant may grow as more or less scattered individuals, but it is sometimes massed together in large areas. In appearance it is grass-like, growing from a root-stock or bulb which looks like an onion; while the flowers are greenish white or yellow and somewhat resemble mignonette. In the Northwest the plant is known by numerous common names, such as lobelia, soap plant, alkali grass, water lily, wild onion, hog's potato, squirrel food, poison sego, etc.

Numerous experiments have been made to discover a remedy for poisoning of sheep caused by eating this plant, but no satisfactory or practical medical remedy has been found. To prevent losses, it is important to recognize the plant and avoid camping stock on it at any time, or grazing upon it when the animals are hungry. If the animals become sick, they should be kept quiet, and under this treatment many will recover.
