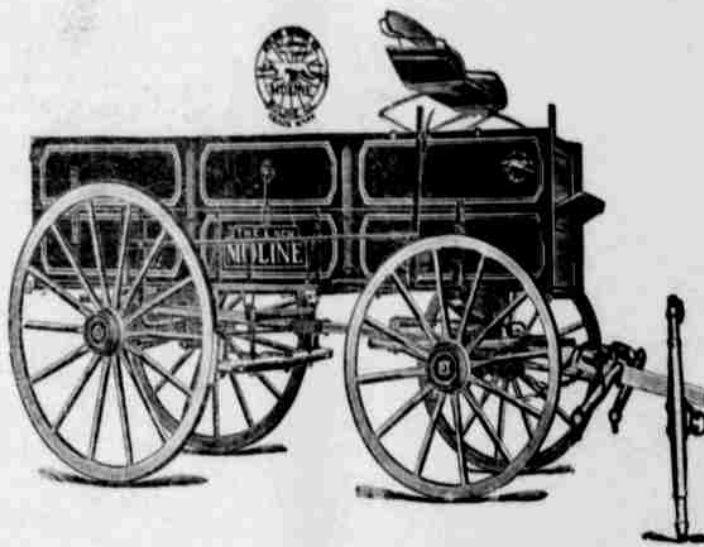

### Plant at Black Rock is Temporarily in Operation

The mill of the Great Western Lumber company at Black Rock, after a long shut down, is now operating, cutting logs on hand. The plant will shut down again as soon as these logs have been converted into lumber. Jay S. Hamilton of Portland is the principal owner of the mill. Mr. Hamilton says that the mill will be operated steadily when lumber values advance to a level that will warrant the cutting of stumps, and he contends this time has not yet arrived, although he looks for considerable activity immediately upon the end of the European war.—Observer.

Corvallis, Aug. 10.—Between 40 and 50 new houses have been built here within the past summer and today bids were advertised for by C. E. Hout for the erection of a two-story business block. Mr. Hout owns a brick building at the corner of Third and Madison streets, 50x100 feet, and the new building is to be a new unit to be added to the present structure, making the building 100x100 feet. The building has been rented and is to be completed February 1 next.

### Auto Sets Fire to Umatilla Wheat Field

Pendleton, Ore., August 10.—Backfiring of an automobile on the R. F. Kirkpatrick ranch near Cayuse, yesterday caused a fire which consumed about 200 acres of wheat on the Kirkpatrick place and spread to the adjoining ranch of George Perringer, where between 80 and 100 acres of grain were burned. The loss is estimated between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

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
