Need Exists for Exhibits of Fresh Fruits, Grains, Etc

LARGE QUANTITIES ARE NOT REQUIRED

Fruits and Vegetables in Season Should be Constantly Going to San Francisco

Imperative need exists at the Oregon Building in San Francisco for exhibits of fresh fruits, vegetables, grains and grasses.

Those in charge at the Panama-Pacific Exposition must depend upon Oregon communities to supply them.

And there is yet a considerable time for the Exposition to run, so it will not do for a "spurt" to be made for a time, followed by a slack period in sending exhibits.

They should be secured whenever opportunity presents, and immediately forwarded by express to the Oregon Building.

The exhibits need not be in large quantities. Send anything of a presentable nature.

The boxes would be sent "collect" and the Oregon Commission will pay the express charges. Where it is necessary to pay express charges in advance, the bill should be sent to O. M. Clark, Portland, who will cause a remittance to be made.

Oregon is recognized as having one of the very best exhibits on the grounds, and it is necessary that it be kept up to standard by the addition of fresh exhibits. In this connection may we urge that you not only begin sending exhibits now but continue the effort right up to closing time.

Fruits which are received at the Oregon Building in larger quantities than needed for exhibit purposes are given away to visitors, all of which is good advertising.

The Oregon prune is so much finer than that grown elsewhere on the coast, that the prune men of Oregon can make a distinct hit just now.

Fruits and vegetables in season should be constantly going to San Francisco from all parts of the state.

Here is the Proof

Uneducated laborers earn on the average of \$500 per year for forty years, a total of \$20,000.

High school graduates earn on the average of \$1,000 per year for forty years, a total of \$40,000.

This education requires 12 years of schooling of 180 days

each, a total of 2160 days in school.

If 2160 days at school add \$20,000 to the income for life, then each day at school \$9.02.

BIG CIRCUS IN DALLAS

Al G. Barnes Wild Animal Show to Exhibit There. 600 Performing Animals Shown.

The Al G. Barnes big three-ring wild animal circus will exhibit in Dallas on Tuesday, August 24.

"The Show That's Different," is a term applied by many prominent critics to the Barnes show. Just why the Barnes show is different from other circuses can be best understood when it is known that the show's entire entertainment is given with a troupe of highly educated wild and domestic animals.

There are over 600 of these animals with the Barnes show, and among them are jugglers, aerial performers, acrobats, bareback riders, high divers, dancers and musicians.

Lions, bears, leopards, goats, dogs, monkeys and sea lions ride galloping horses. Sea lions juggle different articles on their noses while so engaged. Dogs and monkeys dive from the top of the big tent into nets. Elephants stand on their heads. A big African lion makes a trip in a balloon. A troupe of monkeys are trapeze performers, and a troupe of 550 horses and ponies are performers with the show.

The great feature acts are given with ferocious wild animals, 24 full grown African lions being performed in one act. Young women trainers work with large groups of tigers, leopards and bears.

Sixteen of the world's champion dancing horses, give a delightful exhibition of the tango and other popular dances. A hundred beautiful ponies are assembled in military drills and marches.

Clean, clever comedy is provided by fifty clown elephants, goats, monkeys, dogs, ponies, pigs and mules.

The show has a parade, of course—a mile long, and it's worth going miles to see because of the many educated animals shown therein. Performance will be given at 2 and 8 p. m. and the parade at 10:30.

The show will also exhibit in Salem on Friday, August 27.

The First Steel Passenger Car

The first steel passenger car ever built in the United States is on display in the Southern Pacific's exhibit in the transportation building at the Panama-Pacific Exposition. It is coach No. 1806. This car is a product of western brains, having been designed in the company's offices at San Francisco and built at Sacramento in 1906.

Since that time the development of steel has been rapid. The Southern Pacific Company, according to General Superintendent of Motive Power T. W. Heintzman, now has almost 900 all steel, passenger cars, none of any other material having been built for the last seven years. Although the company has a total of 5156 steel cars of all descriptions, these including 147 all-steel baggage, 38 motor and 187 suburban electric cars. The main line coaches are 60 feet long and seat 75 persons. The new cars are fitted with high speed brakes of new design and have powerfully reinforced vestibules. They are lined in mahogany finish and are steam heated. Their advantages combine comfortable riding qualities and safety.

FREE POPCORN LAST SATURDAY

15,000 Half Pound Sacks Were Handed Out

"ALL OREGON DAY" CELEBRATED MONDAY

Dr. Dunsmore of Independence And E. S. Evenden of Monmouth Gave Speeches

Oregon Building, Panama Pacific Exposition, August 19.—On Saturday, the representatives of Eastern Oregon—Lackey and McCully—tendered sacks of popcorn. The city papers had heralded the fact that popcorn would be free at the Oregon building this date—and the entire force is still recovering from the experience of handling that crowd. During the entire afternoon the numbers were such that it was almost impossible to move in or out. No less than 15,000 of the half pound sacks were handed out after 2 o'clock. The patent popper was worked over-time and then broke down or the number of sacks given away might have reached 20,000. The people enjoyed the corn and they enjoyed the crowding; they also took time to enjoy the exhibits on both floors, for the entire building was filled to overflowing. Thus the effort served its purpose; it brought extra ordinary numbers to the building for a glimpse, and many will return to see the exhibits at their leisure and when the crowds are not so great. The people are out to see all there is to see; they are in a holiday spirit, and they like the little extra efforts. They feel that since they expect to go to a certain building they might as well go when there is something special doing. The Oregon building people feel that if they will but come and get one glimpse they will come again and they invariably do so.

On Monday the big Exposition band played for us in honor of "All Oregon Day" and Commissioner John F. Logan and Senator Arthur Langguth of Portland, Dr. W. J. Kerr and George M. Hyland boosted for Oregon in a way that brought enthusiastic applause from the multitudes. On Tuesday Ben Sheldon, of Medford, and Judge William Colvig talked Rogue River Valley and Oregon to a theatre full and throughout the day the Rouge River Valley pictures were viewed by many hundreds. Wednesday was cheese day, Thursday Oregon School Day, Friday Willamette Valley Day, with stewed prunes on tap and Dr. Dunsmore of Independence, E. S. Evenden of Monmouth, F. W. Sullivan of Oregon City, Dr. L. M. Davis of Portland and M. Mosessoehn as speakers. Saturday was the memorable popcorn day—a great week and with the Oregon building more popular than ever.
