High Freight Rates

But Portland has never been able to make any use of her sub-port, simply because the railway lines have constantly refused to extend to the Mouth of the Columbia the same rates that they have extended to competing ocean ports. As I have said, the Mouth of the Columbia physically ranks, as a port, with San Francisco and Puget Sound, yet she has never been accorded equal rates with any Sound port, while comparatively small and insignificant ports such as Willapa Harbor and Gray's Harbor have been for years granted lower freight rates to and from the Inland Empire than have been permitted any port on the lower Columbia; indeed, strange as it may seem, have largely been granted rates on a parity with Puget Sound ports.—Oregon Voter.

Milk Bulletin is Coming

A bulletin that will show the economic features of milk and milk by-products throughout the world will soon be issued by the State University at Eugene. Comparative costs between Oregon and other great milk producing regions will be shown. The purpose will be to indicate whether an outside market exists that would justify great expansion of the dairy industry in this state.

The bulletin is expected to perform the service for dairymen that last year's bulletin entitled "Markets for potatoes" did for potato growers. Four thousand copies of the potato bulletin were distributed and a new edition seems necessary.
