Recommends Milk

To the Editor:—

In the last issue of the HERALD there was a notice to the effect that some person or persons had misrepresented Mr.

MacDonald's dairy business. I am and have been a customer of Mr. MacDonald during the past two years. During that time I have tested and caused to have tested under my supervision many samples from this dairy. I therefore feel in a position to discuss the notice referred to. At no time when the samples were properly taken have the tests dropped below four, they generally read about four and two tenths, some read as high as four and six tenths, this is considered a good herd test. The law (Section 4831 Lord's Oregon Laws) requires that three and two tenths per cent butter fat be present in milk offered for sale. I fail to see how Mr. MacDonald could be guilty of the practice with which he was so unjustly charged; if he were he would never sell milk testing above three and two tenths and all samples for a given day would test the same. I of course know this is not true. Then again if the parties circulating these reports would take the time to visit this dairy, as I have done on several occasions, they would find the machinery necessary to carry on the practices charged, missing. In addition they would go from the premises with a feeling that Monmouth has a dairy of which she may be proud. The barn and milk house are in better condition than most such buildings of this locality. But best of all the proprietors go out of their way to give a square deal to their customers. I take pleasure in offering these remarks for publication.

Town Blocks Mail Houses

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 8.—Every farmer within 15 miles should be asked to become

a member of the town commercial club, and the club should see that as many of the farmers as possible participate in the club's social affairs, says George E. Hardy, the new executive secretary of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, who spoke to the commerce students of the State University recently.

Trenton, Mo., has a commercial club that sent delegations to all the farm homes of the tributary territory. The farmers joined the club. When the commercial club had a social evening—and it saw that a good many were held—farmers stopped work a little early and came.

"Mail order business has been practically driven from the Trenton territory," said Mr. Hardy.

Accurate appraisals of land for new-comers, under commercial club direction and with commercial club guarantee, was another innovation suggested by Mr. Hardy.
