#### Record Jersey Bull Sale

The highest price ever received for a Jersey bull bred in the Willamette valley, or the Northwest,

has just been received by Ed Cary, the Carlton, Ore., Jersey breeder. Mr. Cary has sold a year-old son of St. Mawes' Susie to the Polytechnic school at San Obispo, Calif., for \$1200. St. Mawes' Susie is second only to St. Mawes' Poppy in production in Mr. Cary's herd. She has two years' official records of 814 and 938 pounds of butter and now, at nine years old, although she had milk fever and her front teats are almost ruined, will probably again produce close to 900 pounds of butter. Her daughters are also great producers, and the management showed excellent wisdom in making the purchase. Mr. Cary already held the record for a Jersey bull sale, when he sold a son of St. Mawes' Poppy to H. H. Curtis, of Pullman, Wash., for \$700, about a year ago. — Rural Spirit.
