institution, after the necessary stock had been subscribed. This committee consisted of Messrs. P. O. Powell, Jake Smith and Ed Rogers.

Mr. Slaughter of Independence was present with several ideas to put forth. He is about to be made manager of a co-operative creamery at Salem. Mr. Slaughter did not believe that anything could be accomplished without work and recommended those present who had faith in the ultimate success of the scheme to get busy and raise the necessary money. He read a section from the state statutes to the effect that in the organization of a co-operative concern, sixty percent of the stock must be subscribed and twenty-five percent paid in cash. He said that the agents of the Salem association with which he was to be connected had invaded Polk county and had done some business in the corner nearest to Salem. The Salem

people in taking their subscriptions insisted on an immediate settlement, in cash what could be collected and for the balance the subscriber's note was taken.

There appearing to have been some doubt as to what interest the stock in the proposed creamery would draw, although it had been previously placed at seven percent, the rate was by motion placed at eight percent.

During the course of the meeting an effort was made to increase the amount of individual subscriptions in the gathering and the amount was raised from 349 shares to 385 shares.
