

## Frederick Warde as Silas Marner

Remembered in Monmouth as the Man Who Presented Hamlet at the Normal School in February.

Frederick Warde, the noted English actor, star in the Mutual Masterpicture De Luxe Edition, "Silas Marner," a film adaption of George Eliot's famous novel, which will be shown at the Norm theater on Tuesday, April 11, is one of the greatest of living actors and is a recognized authority on Shakespeare and his dramas. He is well known throughout the Continent and in the United States as a lecturer on Shakespeare and as a star in Shakespearean productions.

His career on the legitimate stage has been a long and brilliant one and his name is familiar to all followers of the best in drama. It was no easy matter to persuade him to act in front of the camera but when he saw the scenario for "Silas Marner" which he declares is his favorite novel, he succumbed to the lure of the screen and consented to appear under the direction of his son Edward Warde, one of the best known directors in film-dom.

Those who remember Mr. Warde on the stage will welcome him to the screen as he has never appeared to such excellent advantage as in the title role in "Silas Marner," a picture which has never been excelled in the history of moving picture dramas.
