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NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS— STREET PAVING

Monmouth, Oregon, April 25, 1916.
Sealed bids will be received at the office of the city recorder of Monmouth, Oregon, until 6 o'clock in the afternoon of May 16, 1916, for the furnishing of all materials and labor and construction of hard surface street paving, consisting of grading streets to sub-grade, building concrete curb lines thereon, constructing hard surface paving and installing a system of storm sewers thereon, all according to the plans and specifications thereof prepared by the Himes Engineering Co. of Dallas, Oregon, now on file in the recorder's office of Monmouth, Oregon, which plans and specifications are hereby referred to, and made a part of this notice as to the general character and nature of said proposed work, except each bidder shall furnish specifications for his kind of paving and may be seen and examined at the office of said recorder or in the office of said Himes Engineering Co. at Dallas, Oregon. That all bids must be accompanied with a certified check of 10 per cent of the total amount of such bid, subject to forfeiture if such bid is accepted and bidder fails to enter into a contract and give bonds for the faithful performance of said work according to terms of such bid and said plans and specifications.

M. thereof, at the council chambers in said city, and at said time and place either accepted or rejected, or at such time as the common council may adjourn its said meeting.
