

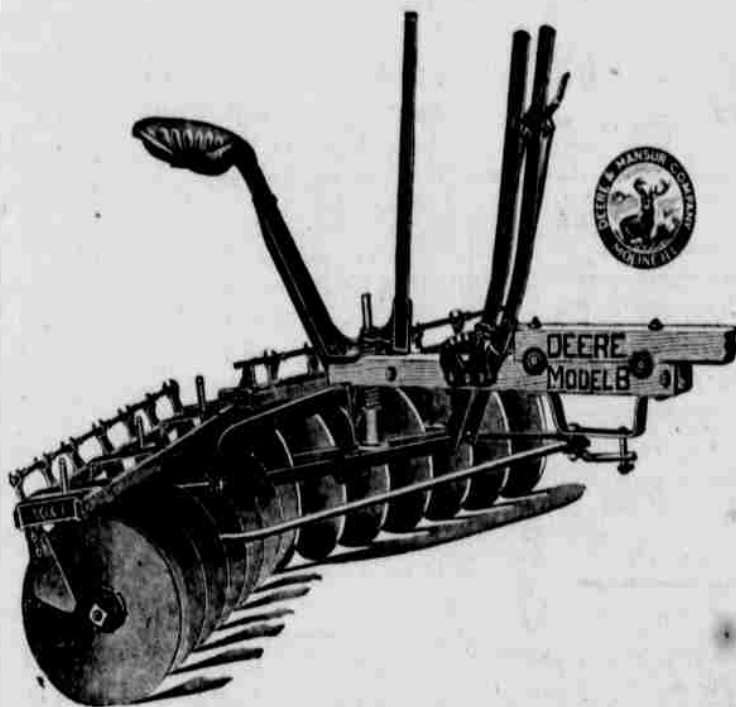

Election Victors & Figures

Primary election day in Monmouth passed off very quietly with a light vote for both political parties. There was only one contest on the Democratic side of the house to stir up enthusiasm; that for the office of assessor. Monmouth gave Fenton a decided majority but in the county his margin was close and the canvassing board's final figures stand at seven. Meyers, the present assessor, has made a satisfactory official but was apparently ousted on the principle that the good things should be passed around.

On the Republican side of the house there were a number of contests and Monmouth's preference lost out in several instances. Swope for district attorney, Macken for county clerk, Mrs. Braden for treasurer, Himes for surveyor, all carried Monmouth but were defeated in the county.
