Dallas Wins From Normals

Last Saturday afternoon the Normal school baseball team played their first game with an outside team. The Normals made an excellent start in the first inning as they secured two hits and two walks which resulted in three runs.

In the second inning Bevins of Dallas made a double play, unassisted, at second base. Dallas also made another double in the third inning by their second and first basemen.

The Normals secured another run in the third inning and this was their last run until the seventh inning.

During the fourth, fifth and sixth innings there were seven Normals who struck out and three who got walks.

In the seventh inning the Normals started with new hope. Butler was on first base and Brumbaugh was at bat. Brumbaugh was able to get a long hit to left field which resulted in a home run. Butler also scored. The score now stood 6 to 7 in favor of Dallas. The eighth inning seemed to be fatal for the Normals. Work, Tallman and Anderson were on bases. Powell was out by a fly ball to the third baseman; Reusser knocked a fly ball to the center fielder, who caught the ball after a long run, and Butler fanned. This was the third out and the bases were full.

Brumbaugh lead off in the ninth by getting a single into center field. Houck got a two base hit out in left field and Brumbaugh scored. Houck was out at third, Rogers knocking a fly ball to third base. Work

and Tallman were on bases but Anderson was out at first. This was the last chance for the Normals to score.

Brumbaugh pitched during the first four innings, allowing only two hits, and Dallas scored two runs. Houck pitched the next four innings, although he had a sore arm, allowing four hits. Tallman pitched during the ninth inning.

The Normals lost the game by a score of 7 to 9, due largely to the great number of errors they made. Dallas played a very consistent game throughout with the exception of the first inning when they allowed three runs.

There were a number of changes in the line up on both sides during the latter half of the game.
