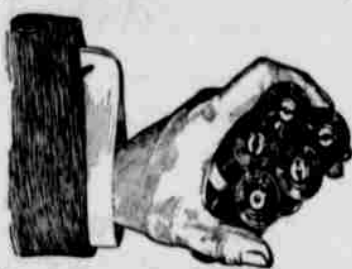

Normals Win in a Second Game

Last Friday afternoon the Mon-
mouth High School played a re-
turn game with the Normal
School on the Normal School
grounds, which was the last game
of the season for the Normals.

In the first inning Mulkey was
out by a fly ball to the pitcher;
Knapp and Walker got singles
into right field. Ted McKenzie
was safe at first on an error and
G. Walker got a single base hit
into center field. The bases were
full and Knapp was out at home.
Later, C. Walker and McKenzie
scored. Portwood was the last
one to bat this inning as he made
the third out by knocking a fly
ball to short stop.

Rogers lead off for the Nor-
mals. He got a safe hit near
third base. Tallman was safe at
first and Lund was out at first.
Brumbaugh secured a two base
hit in left field which scored
Rogers and Tallman. Houck got
a two bagger into left field and
Brumbaugh scored. Houck was
out at third. Evans was on sec-
ond when Anderson made the
third out by a fly ball to Port-
wood.

The second inning looked bad
for the Normals. Sacre was safe
at first on an error; Hiltibrand
fanned; Strong got a single into
right field and Mulkey followed
by a single to left field and Sacre
and Strong scored. Knapp fanned
and C. Walker, McKenzie and
G. Walker connected up for three
singles. This resulted in four
runs for M. H. S. Portwood was
safe at first on an error. Sacre
fanned and made the third out.
This was his second time at bat
this inning.

In the second inning Rogers
was the only Normal who saw
first base.

But they made good in the
third inning. Brumbaugh and
Anderson got walks; Houck and
Jack Wood both were able to get
two base hits. The Normals
scored three runs. The M. H.
S. players never saw first base
in the third inning.

In the fourth inning M. H. S.
got a single hit by Knapp and G.
Walker got the only three base
hit for M. H. S. They secured
four runs, making ten runs for
M. H. S. The Normals batted
around this inning and Tallman
and Lund batted twice. The M.
H. S. seemed to have lost the
game during this inning as they
made six errors which resulted
in five runs for the Normals.
The Normals did not get a hit
this inning.

During the fifth, sixth and
seventh innings the M. H. S. was
credited with only two hits.
Three fanned and nobody scored
during the last three innings.

During the fifth inning Evans
made a long drive into center
field which proved to be a three
base hit. The Normals got four
hits and three runs in the fifth
and sixth innings which resulted
in winning the game without
their having to take their bat in
the last half of the seventh, the
