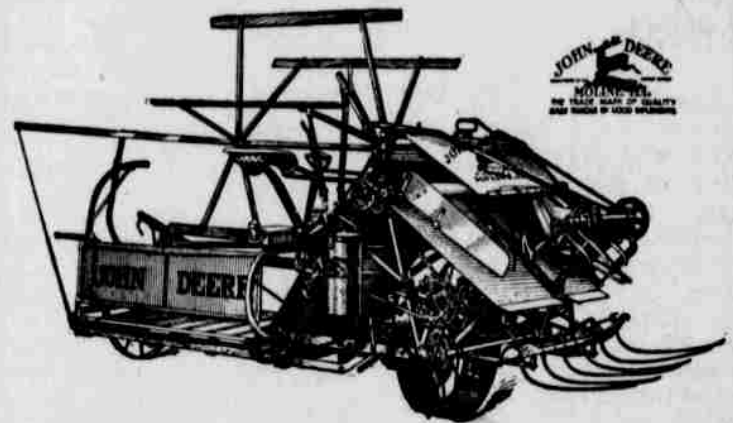

Rebecca J. Buchanan was born in Indiana on March 19, 1837. In her childhood her parents moved to Missouri. She was married to W. J. Emmitt in 1856. To them were born Amos A., William S., James C., Nathan A., Jannette S., Ella E. and John A.

They moved to Oregon in 1875, settled at Monmouth, Polk county, where she resided for many years. She was married to John Ostertag in Drain, Oregon, in 1902. Since his death she has made her home with her children who still survive her: Nathan Emmitt of Portland, Jenetta Butler of Scappoose, Ella Baldwin of Yoncalla and John Emmitt of Eugene.

She was a woman of a kind, lovable disposition and had won many dear friends in our community during the different visits with her daughter, Mrs. Butler, and through her last few weeks of sickness, which was borne with great patience and cheerfulness.

Funeral services were held at the late residence on Thursday, at 2 p. m. Rev. C. H. Johnston officiated. Interment took place at Fairview cemetery. Many beautiful floral offerings attested to the affection of friends and neighbors.

B. F. Nichols who came to Oregon in 1844 and who was sheriff of the district covering Polk county in 1846, was a visitor in Dallas last week.
