### Favor a Second Normal

Salem, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—Indorsement of the proposed constitutional amendment to establish a normal school at Pendleton was given today in a resolution adopted by county school superintendents of the state who are in session here correcting state examination papers.

The resolution follows: "Resolved, That it is the sense of the county school superintendents of the state of Oregon, in convention assembled, that the best interests of the schools of the state demand increased facilities for the training of the teachers, and that we, therefore, indorse the initiative measure to establish a normal school at Pendleton."

river.

During the first ten years of the Recorder's existence school conditions were of the most primitive. Once in a great while a traveling show came into the district but for the most part public entertainment took the form of lyceums and dancing.

At the time work was started on the railroad from Drain to Coos bay, Mr. Stitt had a chance to sell and took advantage of the opportunity. This railroad was for the most part graded, tied and rails were laid on it and then it was abandoned. Recently bridge beams and rails from this right of way were taken up and placed on the line from Eugene to Coos Bay.

Mr. Stitt moved his family to Springfield and lived there a short time, buying the Herald

and moving to Monmouth just before the election that put the Normal school on a sound foundation.

Mr. Stitt was a militant Christian, a member of the Reorganized church of Latter Day Saints. He was sincere and unaffected, a man of rigid honesty and one who often sacrificed business profits to do what he believed to be right. He held the office of city recorder of Monmouth for several years and he rendered faithful and efficient service.

He is survived by the widow and five children, Lysle Stitt who is keeper of the light house at Point Arena, Cal., Mrs. Frank Lenhart of Springfield, Mrs. Blanche Scheible of Monmouth, Lawrence Stitt of Bandon and Mrs. J. B. Sowash of Portland. An older daughter died in childhood.

The funeral was held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 and was attended by a large number of old friends of the dead editor. Elder Marcus Cook of Portland preached an able sermon over the remains and burial was had in the K. P. cemetery.
