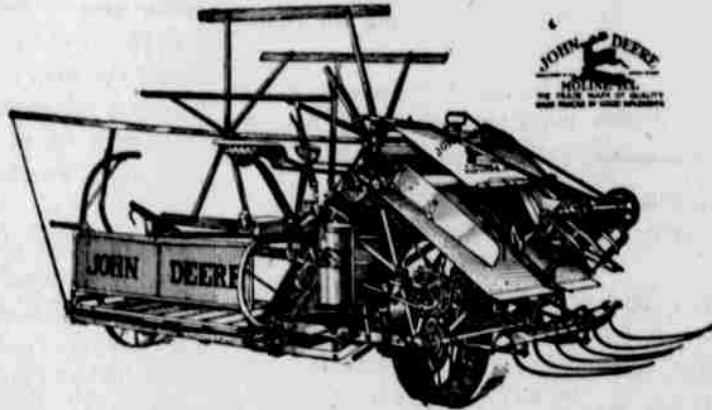

Old Home Reminiscences

R. L. Dashiell was given a party on the occasion of his 76th birthday anniversary last Thursday evening. He was presented with a beautiful gold watch fob as a token of the regard in which he is held here. Mr. Dashiell received a letter Monday from his old home in Kentucky, enclosing pictures of the old home and other familiar scenes. One was a picture of the family burial ground on the old estate. The custom of those days and places was to bury the dead on the home place. This burial ground has been reserved and kept separate in all the transfers of the land since then. Mr. Dashiell's father, Dr. G. W. Dashiell, was a large owner of slaves in the old days and the old homestead joined that of Dick Taylor and the father of Jeff Davis. In fact, Mr. Dashiell's sister witnessed the marriage of Jeff Davis and Betty Taylor, his first wife, at the Dick Taylor home. Mr. Dashiell was very reminiscent of the old days when such a thing as a public school was unknown and the southland was in the bloom of its fairest days.
