Give the Young Men a Chance

Carl B. Fenton, Democratic candidate for County Assessor, is a native of Polk county, was educated at the University of Oregon, and his people on both sides came from sturdy pioneer stock. Lieutenant French, a recruiting officer from Salem, was in Monmouth Monday putting up posters and looking after prospects. Under a new law each 2nd, 3rd and 4th class postmaster in the country becomes an aid in the recruiting work. The design is to create an army and to do so it is the aim to get one recruit from each thousand inhabitants each year.

When the citizen becomes a recruit he is drilled and given his expenses and \$15 per month. When he becomes sufficiently drilled to take part in the maneuvers which is within three months, he is given \$18 per month and if he attains the rank of corporal, which is the lowest office in the company, he gets \$24 per month and if he qualifies as an expert rifleman he gets \$3 additional per month.

When a recruit has been with the army a year he is expected to become proficient in the use of arms and may be put on the reserve list. He will then be allowed to return home but will be subject to call in case his services are needed. Should he be on the reserve list and be called to duty he will receive full pay for all the time he has been in reserve, but should he not be called to
