

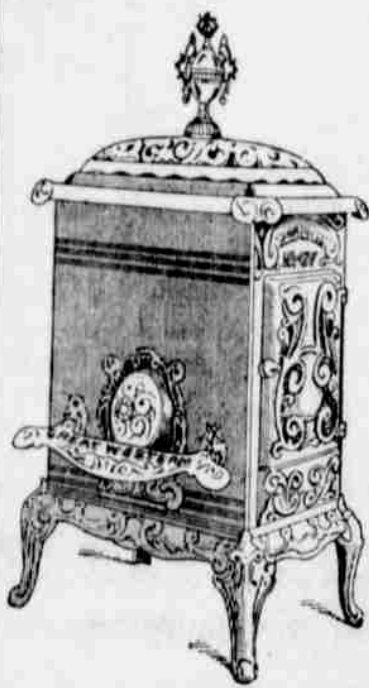

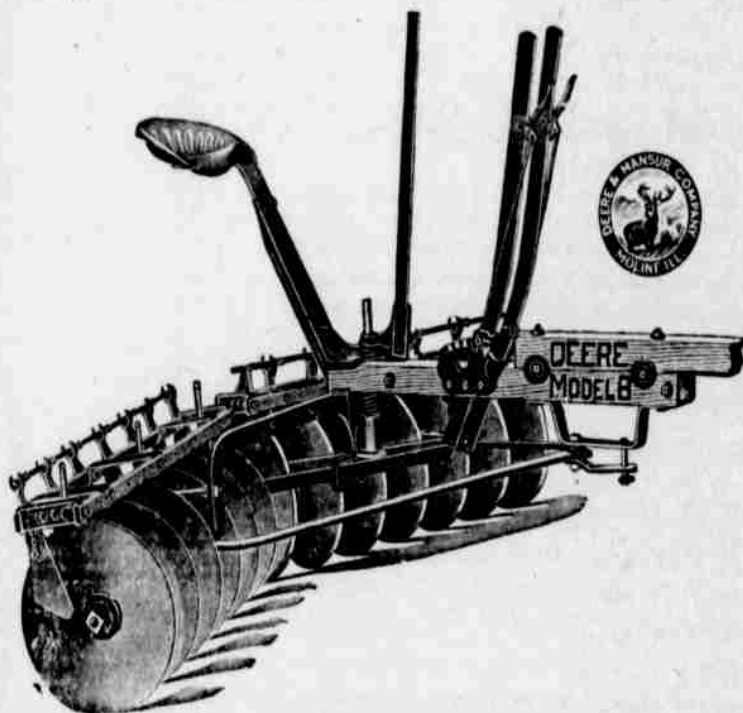

The following letter from Prof. Keezel at Eugene will be of interest to many of our readers:

Please send the Herald to the address above. I shall appreciate copies of the last two issues, provided you may have extra copies. My copy has been misplaced at the Y. M. C. A. in some way. So many things must have happened in the best town in Polk county during the last three weeks. I shall feel obliged to beg for the Herald.

I am very comfortably settled in a very beautiful part of Eugene, known as Fairmount. I shall appreciate having you visit us when you are in Eugene.

I hear some very good reports from both the Normal school and the high school. And, lest I should forget it, I have heard several people call attention to the fact that "Monmouth is paving the streets". A very favorable report is being circulated.

The University has made a considerable gain as you have no doubt noted in the Bulletin. The most remarkable gain I have noted is the very fine spirit of cooperation existing between faculty and students. Oregon has always been credited with a fine spirit of cooperation of students and faculty, but I am sure I am not mistaken in saying that President Campbell's words spoken at the first Assembly are true. He said in effect, "The University is now becoming A Greater University both in the attitude of students and in the quality of its services to the state."
