The curved iron re-inforcement for the curb corners has at last arrived and Contractor Judd is busy when the weather allows in finishing his part of the paving contract. Nothing definite has been heard from the contractors as to when they will be ready to lay the concrete but the stopping of traffic on the street is getting irksome to Monmouth merchants and they will make a strong effort to get the contractors started.

In reporting on the fate of the amendments in the state the Oregonian says the dry amendment has been defeated by 6,000 votes. The brewers law was snowed under by a majority that may reach 35,000. Single tax has been defeated by a very large majority and the Pendleton Normal school appears defeated by a small number of votes. The ship tax exemption carried, the anti-vaccination law is close, the single item veto was decisively carried, negro suffrage has carried, the Sunday law is to be repealed, rural credits has carried in the state.

Rev. F. M. Fisher performed a marriage ceremony Thursday by which Chas. W. Kenney and Miss Minnie Wunder were made man and wife. The bride is a daughter of Herman Wunder, living west of Monmouth. She is a Normal graduate and has many friends here to wish her happiness. The groom is a prosperous farmer of Eastern Oregon and had 200 acres of wheat this year. The wedding was a quiet one and the happy couple leave in their auto for a honeymoon into Idaho before settling down to house-keeping at Grass Valley.

There was a large crowd out to the joint program of the Normal literary societies last Friday evening, many citizens of the city taking advantage of the opportunity to watch the work of the representatives of the societies. Several musical numbers were presented, among them being some characteristic appearances of Mr. Benjamin of the Normal society. His original song, referring to J. B. V. Butler, made a tremendous hit. A feature of the evening was the presentation of the Masque of Longfellow's Pandora. It was prettily staged and very nicely acted. The Normal boys presented a debate on the Labor Union question, the Unions being upheld by Messrs. Forsyth and Newhouse and the opposition by Messrs. Williamson and Richardson. The decision of the judges favored the latter. Just as the Vespertine part of the program was to be presented a fuse burned out, destroying the lights, and the crowd had to be dispersed in the darkness. The inability of the Vespertines to appear is regretted for they had a few Halloween stunts that would have been interesting.
