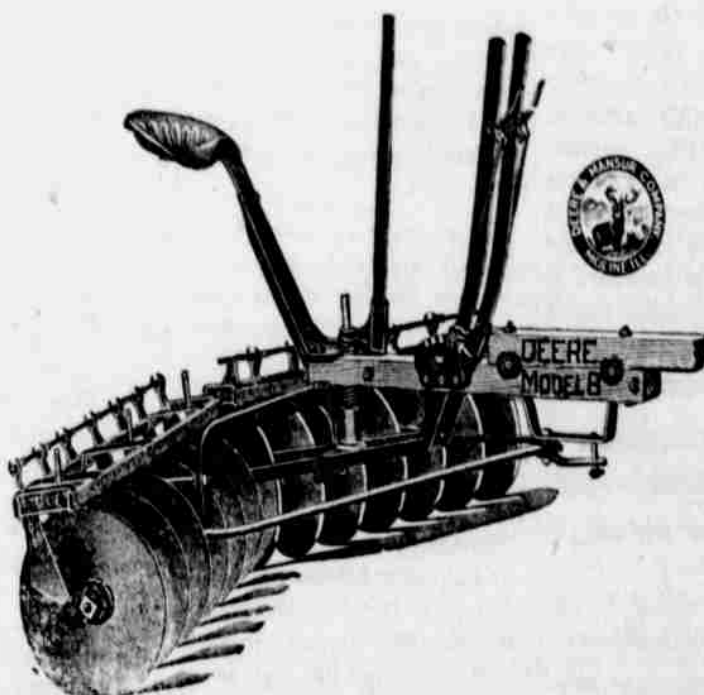

The annual city election of Independence takes place December 4th.

The Dallas city council has reduced the theatrical license tax from \$100 to \$60. The license originally was \$40.

A. Gilbert Sloper, formerly a resident of Independence, died in Salem October 31. He was forty years of age.

John S. Moore of Independence died last week, aged 73 years.

R. G. Simon has sold a 160 acre farm 4 miles south of Monmouth to a Mr. Hansen of South Dakota, for \$17,000 and 60 acres two miles out of Forest Grove. The Simon property was valued at \$100 per acre.

Electrification of the Southern Pacific line between Corvallis and Independence is about completed but trains will not be handled by electricity until next spring, due to the inability of the company to get the necessary power machinery.

An injunction has been issued by Judge Belt that may delay the completion of the construction of the Valley & Siletz railroad. A part of Ninth street in Independence is affected. The railroad company may go into court or condemn, either of which will result in delay.

Hughes lead in the county over Wilson is shown by the official count to be 60 votes. Hawley has 934 votes more than Weatherford. Mr. Benson, the socialist candidate for president polled 190 votes in the county and Hanley, prohibitionist, 124. Emmett Callahan, progressive, secured 4 votes.

That the farmers in the vicinity of Monmouth favor a county agricultural agent was indicated by sentiment displayed at the Grange

meeting last Saturday afternoon. The matter was not endorsed for recommendation to the county court but an effort will be made to learn more relative to the duties and responsibilities of the agriculturist and the benefits to be derived. When this is ascertained, if action is deemed proper it will be taken.

Hardly was the ink dry on the last issue of the Herald before the news transpired that Chairman Rowell of the California Republican committee had conceded that state to Wilson and that, therefore the Democratic nominee was the winner. Friday morning's Oregonian carried on its front page large pictures of Wilson and Marshall. This was accepted as conclusive by both sides although some who have wagers are waiting for the last word on the official count in California. But the news from California filled Monmouth Democrats with a glee, the edge of which has barely worn off in a week's time.

A feature of the Grange meeting Saturday was the exhibition of three giant potatoes by W. J. Stockholm who offered them to the best guesser of the total weight of the tubers. Mrs. Ostrom proved best guesser and got the potatoes. The three potatoes weighed 5 lbs.

Faye Dunsmore and friend, Mr. Newton of Independence were visitors in Monmouth Wednesday. Mr. Dunsmore is just back from a summer in Alaska where he worked on one of the steamboats on the Yukon. He likes the prospects in Alaska and plans to return there next Spring.

At the next meeting of the Grange, election of officers will take place.
