

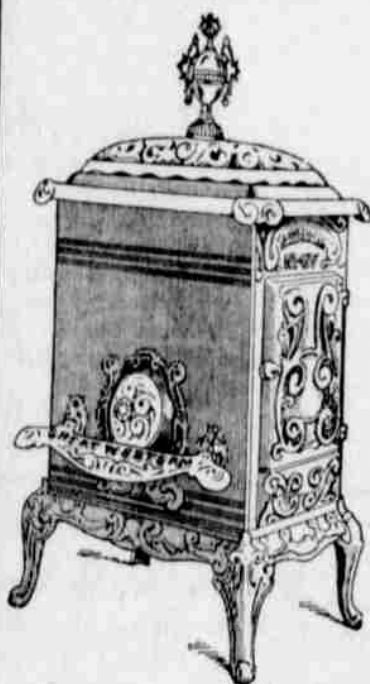

Items of Interest

Peter C. Price was a successful applicant through the civil service for the postmastership of Ballston.

A crew is at work in Independence putting up poles for the electrification of the Southern Pacific lines. It looks as though, within a few years there would be no more steam locomotives on the west side of the Willamette.

The home of M. M. Ellis at Newport was partially destroyed by fire recently. It was occupied by Mrs. Ella Metzgar of Dallas who had just moved in that morning, and who with her friend, Mrs. Bryan of Newberg, had planned to spend the winter there.

The new Helmick bridge across the Luckiamute, south of this city, is now complete but can not be used until its approaches are filled in. Because of the season of the year it is likely that the filling can not be done until next year. The bridge is of wood with a covered central span and is 100 feet in length. It rests on concrete piers.

The convention of the Oregon State Music Teachers' Association opens Thanksgiving night in Portland and continues two days. The railroads will sell tickets at reduced rates, and information given out by Mr. Daniel H. Wilson, corresponding secretary, gives assurance of an interesting series of concerts alternating with business sessions.

There is on exhibition in the First National Bank a photograph of the exhibit of Polk county which won honors at Salem, Portland and Seattle in

the fairs in those cities. Mrs. Winnie Braden, secretary of the Polk county fair, arranged this exhibit and she attends the meeting of the Northwest Fair Association at Portland December 5-8, where she will speak upon the subject of uniform classification of exhibits.

A. Sampson of Falls City has brought suit for \$2410 against Chas. Hartung of the same town for damages sustained when struck by an automobile. Sampson has drawn up a classified list of his injuries, asking \$2,000 on general principles for damage to his anatomy and feelings; \$20 for a suit of clothes destroyed; \$125 for medical attention and \$25 for incidentals not included under the other heads.

E. K. Piasecki the newly elected district attorney has resigned as an officer of Company L, Oregon National Guard and has asked to be placed on the reserve list. The question of whether a salaried military position is an "office" in the political sense of the word is now up to the authorities and if they rule this to be the case, Conrad Staffrin our new member of the legislature will also seek to be put on the reserve list.

No large sums of money were spent by the Polk county candidates during the past campaign, the highest expenditure being that of Walter Tooze, \$109.60. E. K. Piasecki spent \$98.75 and other candidates spent the following amounts: Graves \$46.95; Orr \$35; Miss Fuller \$76.35; Crowley \$55.50; Robinson \$62.39; Holman \$53.80; Manston \$22.25; Bohannon \$14.35; Robb \$14.65; Taylor \$38.
