Special Law Passed.

By a law which was signed by the governor last Thursday and went into effect immediately, Monmouth acquired undisputed possession of Main street and such part of Monmouth Avenue as extends from Main street to the street north of the dormitory. The law which was launched at the meeting of the city council January 25th, went through the legislature without opposition. It was introduced by Senator Hawley, passed the senate Jan. 29 and the house Feb. 6. It was signed by the president and speaker Feb. 7th and by the governor on the following day.

The primary purpose of the bill was to affect the street paving already done, assessments for which have not yet been levied, although a part of the work is done. It will also affect future improvement on the streets included. There still remains of county highways in the city, subject to county improvement, the road which runs from the post office south and the road running west from the dormitory.
