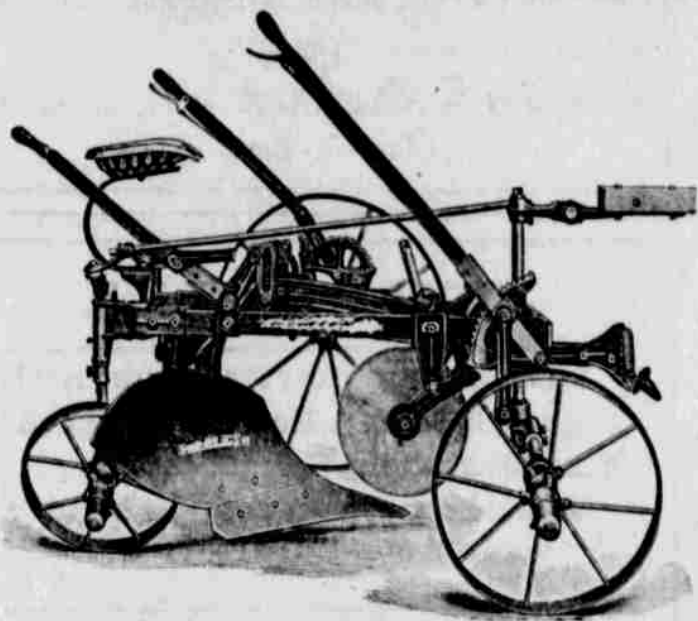

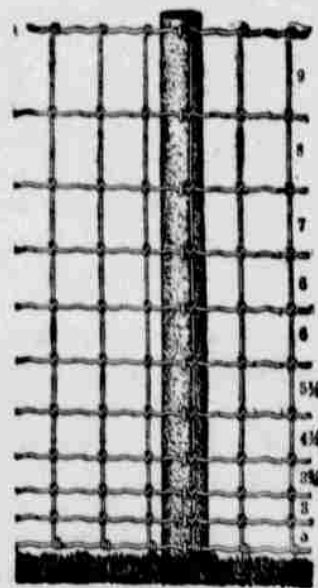

The Working Hen

Yes, it pays to advertise in the Herald or any other good paper when you have the goods to back up your advertisement. I guarantee my stock to lay if fed properly. Give them a good scratching pen, good roosting quarters and plenty of fresh air.

Keep before your fowls all the time, first grade grit, bone, shell charcoal and bran, so they can get it at will. Also keep a box, partly filled with dry dirt or ashes with plenty of lice powder sifted into it, in your pen and your fowls will all be practically free from lice and healthy.

I have had people tell me the fowls won't dust in the ashes. Put it before them and watch and see if they do not dust freely.

You feed your cattle and horses first class grain, and give them a good comfortable stall and plenty of bedding but for the chickens—oh well, that old shed out back of the barn with fourteen dozen holes in the roof is plenty good enough for them. They will lay next spring—maybe.

Most of these old sheds are infested with lice which sap the life of the hen and keep her from laying. In the warm weather of Spring the hens get ashamed of themselves and lay a few eggs.

The next thing you'll notice in these back yard chicken lots is that they contain scrubs, mongrels, any kind of cross-breed known to chickendom.

If you are going to keep chickens then the best thing you can do is to build a good, up-to-date, scratching shed, get some well bred, laying strain of fowls that you fancy most. Give them half a chance and they will do their part toward supplying your table with nice fresh eggs.

Kill or sell off those old hens that you have had for ten years that lay from ten to 15 eggs every spring. Get some good young stock and start right.

I have some ninety hens and pullets of Barred Rock and White Leghorns of the O. A. C. laying strain. In January these fowls laid 1150 eggs. At their present rate they will lay 1600 eggs in February. 1300 of these eggs will be used for hatching purposes this month. Which indicates an awakening to the desirability of results from the working hen.
