Here is what my Leghorns are doing on good, average care.—Pen No. 1, containing ten birds, averaged 7 eggs a day during February. This last week as follows—9-9-9-3-8-10-7. Total 55 eggs or practically 8 eggs a day

Pen No 2 consisting of ten birds averaged six and one half eggs a day during February. This last week 49 eggs or 7 eggs a day.
