Battle with Booze

Mr. Baker, president of the Oregon Anti-Saloon League, was the speaker at a union meeting in the Christian church last Sunday morning. Mr. Baker detailed the success of prohibition in Oregon, how it had reduced municipal expenses and increased the revenues of tradesmen. The effect was even noticeable in the fire department, he said, for the records showed that the fire calls had been very much less frequent this past year than for the year preceding.

At the same time it was necessary to keep constant vigilance against illegal attempts to bring liquor into the state. He said that eggs had been sent in that had had the egg blown from the shell, the openings cemented over and the shell filled with whisky. He told of an automobile that had a whisky tank within its gasoline tank and of the preacher, who roomed at the Y. M. C. A., and made numerous trips into the state with numerous suit cases until it was found that the cases were filled with bottles.

Liquor has been brought into the state in sacks of coal, in loads of grain and vegetables, in the tires of automobiles and the smaller boats are all subject to suspicion. However, said the lecturer, a close watch is being kept, many detectives are on guard at exposed places and it takes highly cultivated cunning to successfully bring liquor into Oregon at present.
