Mr. A. J. Larson lost one of his best cows last week.

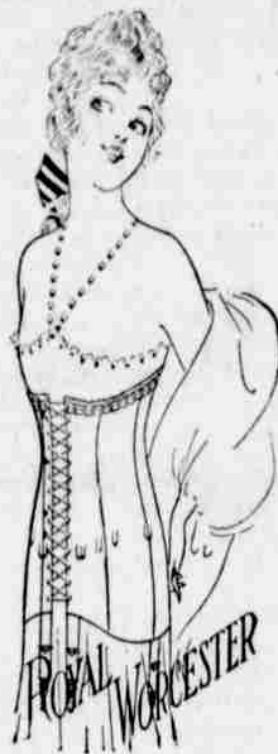
