To Finish Paving When Weather Will Allow it

There was no quorum Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the Council and the meeting adjourned until Tuesday night, May 22nd, when bids will be opened for the paving of Monmouth avenue. There is a growing sentiment that unless the bids are reasonable there will be no paving this year.

The recorder reported a letter received from Hobson and Hoskins to the effect that they were ready and anxious to go to work and finish the Main street paving as soon as the weather is favorable. This will require a stretch of warm dry weather as with moisture or cold weather the gravel and composition will not fuse properly.

The mayor, recorder and city engineer and councilman Wolverton were the only officers present for the meeting. Both councilmen Riddell and Stump were out of town and Mr. Hampton was indisposed.

The meeting to discuss Red Cross activities, held in the high school building Tuesday night was well attended. Ira C. Powell presided. Miss Parrott explained the features of the popular branch of the society and said the most practical thing all could do at present was to sign the roll of membership and contribute a dollar. Men and women are alike eligible. Over forty have signed the roll and the next proceeding is to form a local chapter to co-operate with like organizations in Oregon.

The First National Bank of this city is one of the designated agents authorized to receive subscriptions for the new government war bonds, known as the Liberty Loan. Any one interested for investment may receive detailed information at the bank.

The banks throughout the country have made subscriptions for these bonds and the government officials offer it to the public believing it a patriotic duty for individuals to supply funds for war necessities at this time. The First National has subscribed liberally to the Loan and there have already been two other applications from local people.

The Student Body of the high school will elect officers next Friday. Last Friday morning was given over to nominations with the following results: President, Ermine Gentle; Vice President, Burton Bell; Secretary, Frances Pyle; Treasurer, Geo. W. Walker; Member at large, Gail Hiltibrand; Editor of High Ways, Francis Arant; Yell leader, Ellis Fisher; Business manager, Dell Tedrow.

Walter Toose, Jr. the Dallas lawyer and H. W. Brune of the Dallas Observer have been notified to proceed to San Francisco Saturday to enter the camp for the training of reserve officers. This is a three month course and if the candidates pass successfully they are to be given commissions with the new army. Ed F. Coad will handle the business of Toose during his absence.

J. H. Britten of Los Angeles was the platform orator at the Evangelical church last Sunday morning and evening, and his eloquence was much appreciated by large audiences on both occasions.

C. R. Butler shipped a car of oats Wednesday, sold for 80c per bushel.

The sheriff of each county has charge of the census which the government will take as a preliminary to selective drafting. Sheriff Orr has sent out notices to judges and clerks of election asking them to tender their services to the government in this work. The chairman in each precinct is to be a census marshal and the registration will take place at the regular polling places at a date to be announced later. Owners of the polling places are expected to tender them rent free as the government objects to paying for the census, expecting that it will be done as an exhibition of patriotic interest.

There must be a million people in the United States at present revolving over in their minds plans for combating the submarine. The torpedo is the real article with which they are contending. The torpedo is not shot from a cannon like a shell but is released and propels itself by means of compressed air. It has a sensitive nose, wadded with gun cotton which does the damage. How to divert the course of the torpedo or explode it before it reaches its mark, is the problem and with so many inventors tackling it a solution must come.

The supreme court handed down an opinion the first of the week affirming the decision of Judge Belt in the North Independence street line question. The city attempted or did remove several street lines in that part of the city, after an official survey by County Surveyor Canfield. The new line was not satisfactory to residents living on Main street, who sought an injunction from Judge Belt. The Judge not only granted the injunction, but made it permanent after a hearing. Then the city appealed to the supreme court, which resulted as above stated. All the costs of the case, including briefs, witness fees, etc., must be paid by the city.

While the case has been pending in the courts, it has "balled" up improvements in North Independence. Now that the case has been settled it is hoped that sidewalks will be built at once so that portion of our city will get out of the mud.—Monitor.
