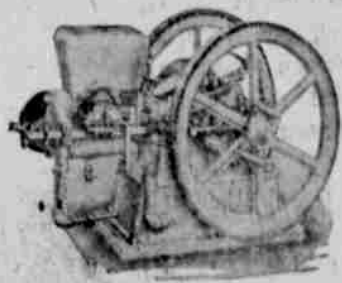

### **OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST**

#### **Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.**

Fires have done much damage this season in Curry county.

Mid-Columbia fishermen are planning for a rich harvest this season.

The supreme court, now on its vacation, will reconvene September 4.

Albany may have an agricultural and stock fair and race meet October 11, 12 and 13.

Astoria will celebrate its 22nd annual regatta August 31, September 1, 2 and 3.

Telephone girls of Portland have organized a union affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

Reports to the public service commission indicate an increasing car shortage on the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon.

Shock caused by the fire that destroyed Sumpter and took all his possessions caused the death of V. R. Meador, aged 76.

Corvallis will vote on September 4 on several bond issues and a referred ordinance to close the moving picture theaters on Sunday.

Ofio D. Center, director of extension at the University of Idaho, has been appointed extension director of the Oregon Agricultural college.

Shipbuilders in Portland and on the Columbia river are protesting against insurance rates that they are required to pay on vessels under construction.

The elevator at Shuttler's Station, Gilliam county, is nearing completion, and is almost ready to receive grain. The elevator will hold 125,000 bushels.

Lane county farmers are enthusiastic over results obtained by using a squirrel-poison formula prescribed by the United States department of agriculture.

The Pacific highway through the northern section of Linn county, from Albany northward to the county boundary line at Jefferson, will be paved next year.

The heaviest run of salmon in several years is in progress at the mouth of the Columbia river and every

cannery is working to capacity packing the fish.

Governor Withycombe has issued an appeal to the citizens of Oregon asking them to give aid to the sufferers from the fire which practically wiped out the town of Sumpter.

Governor Withycombe says that because of the dry weather that has prevailed the 300 acres of flax being harvested by the state will be practically a total failure.

The Eugene Woollen Mills company is delivering khaki cloth to the United States government at the rate of 3000 yards a month. The mill has contracted to supply 25,000 yards.

Dr. J. L. Masson of Myrtle Point, who is examining dairy cows for the state livestock board, has condemned 36 head of cows afflicted with tuberculosis in the Coquille valley.

Milo Lantz, aged 49, well-known resident of Molalla, was instantly killed while putting hay into his barn. Mr. Lantz was standing on the load, using a hay rake, which fell and struck his heart.

Because of high price of feed small flocks of poultry in the state are being reduced at an alarming rate, according to E. J. McClanahan, president of the Oregon State Poultry Breeders' association.

That students may give all possible assistance in getting in the crops, the authorities of Pacific college at Newberg, have decided to postpone the opening of the fall term which was to have been September 17.

Though it was held almost a month later than ordinarily because of the lateness of the season, the Cove cherry fair, held last week, was altogether successful. There was a large attendance from surrounding districts.

For the third time in its history the 30-year-old town of Ruthon, an O.W. R. & N. station and home of a big planing mill of the Stanley-Smith Lumber company, burned, the fire entailing a loss of more than \$25,000.

Governor Withycombe has appointed W. C. Trill, of Fossil, as district attorney for Wheeler county, to succeed J. K. Starr, who resigned to go to the Presidio, San Francisco, where he hopes to obtain a commission in the army.

Despite the drouth, Lane county farms will produce an average crop this year and the farmers will receive more money when it is marketed than for many years, according to

a statement issued by County Agricultural Agent Robb.

The state board of control received bids for a second time on the \$400,000 issue of Bean-Barrett road bonds, the second bids being asked for to ascertain whether a better figure could be received on shorter term bonds. The highest bid was from E. H. Rollins & Sons, of Chicago, through the Capital National bank, of Salem, for \$388,040, or 97.01 on 100. This is approximately \$16,000 better than the highest bid the last time.

Attorney General Brown has been requested by the Smith-Powers logging company to investigate the sale of Jamaica ginger extract by grocery stores as the company says its men are using the stuff for booze.

The first installment of the half million trout fry that will be distributed this season in the waters of Umatilla county, was placed in the north fork of the Umatilla, near Meacham, and at Bingham Springs.

Captain L. L. Pendleton of Vancouver Barracks has announced the names of 131 Oregon men who are successful applicants for the second reserve officers' training camp to open at the Presidio, San Francisco, August 27.

A marked increase in the number of pupils who entered high school after completing the elementary grades is shown in annual reports of county school superintendents of Oregon now being filed with State Superintendent Churchill.

In the belief that their fellow-countrymen cannot rest in peace in their present graves in Lone Fir cemetery, Portland Chinese are having the bodies of 500 deceased brothers and sisters exhumed, preparatory to sending them back to China.

The biennial reorganization meeting of the state livestock sanitary board was held in Salem. The following officers were elected: J. M. Dickson, Shedd, president; Walter K. Taylor, Corvallis, vice-president. Dr. Lytle is ex-officio secretary.

To prevent the spread of calf cholera throughout Oregon, the state livestock sanitary board ordered that calves in all coast counties be vaccinated for the disease before being shipped to eastern Oregon points. The disease is prevalent in Tillamook and Coos counties.

By sawing a hole through the roof of the state penitentiary, dropping by a rope down the front wall of the

building and calmly walking out of the front gate, Robert Burns and J. B. Burg, both serving from two to 20 years for forgery, effected their escape.

The department of the interior has issued its Crater Lake hand book for the season of 1917. It contains directions for reaching the lake, a description of the wonderful body of water in southern Oregon, the Indian myths about it and the Crater Lake national park regulations.

Complaint was filed at Salem, under the public convenience and necessity act, by the North Coast Power company against the Portland Gas & Coke company, asking that the Portland company be required to cease invading the Tualatin valley in competition with the plaintiff company, without having first obtained a certificate of public necessity as required by law.

Marion county fruitgrowers and hopmen declare the saving of thousands of tons of these products this season depends on whether the Portland school board postpones the opening of the Portland schools to October. Opening of the Portland schools causes the return to Portland of many large families. Farmers say serious losses will result, because of the late crops, if they are deprived of this labor.

Oregon's output of precious metals is increasing, according to a bulletin just issued by the United States geological survey. A steady increase in yield of copper is apparent so far this year and also in silver. Although the deep mines are not producing so much gold as in 1915, the placer mines are giving up more of the metal. In 1916 Oregon mines yielded 794 per cent more of copper than the year before. Last year's metal production in this state increased \$939,969 over 1915, a gain of 47 per cent.

Seven inches of rain fell in one hour, and huge hailstones alided in beating the crops into the ground.

Oregon apple men will be given an opportunity to get additional training in the newest and best methods of grading and packing apples and pears at a fruit packing school to be held by the horticultural department of the Oregon Agricultural college, September 4 to 15.

Out of every 100 pupils attending

the public schools of the state, approximately 95 never missed a day during the last school year, according to the annual reports of county school superintendents being filed in the office of J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction.

Federal licenses to millers, elevators and warehousemen to transact business under the regulations of the Hoover food administration will be issued in a few days, according to information received by M. H. Houser, in charge of grain buying and distribution in the Pacific northwest.

During the month of June employees in Oregon who were insured under the workmen's compensation law labored an aggregate total of 1,225,975 work days. During that same month there were 17 fatal accidents and 1321 accidents all told, reported to the state industrial accident commission.

Unusual crop conditions this year are resulting in a shortage of straw and now the Oregon state hospital, which uses a large quantity of straw for stock feed and bedding, is paying \$8 a ton for baled straw. This is nearly three times as much as has been paid heretofore for straw.
