BRUSSELS SPROUTS.—Pick over the sprouts, soak them in cold water twenty minutes, and then drain. Next, cook them twenty minutes in boiling water with the kettle uncovered and add a quarter teaspoonful of soda. Drain and serve with melted butter.

Creamed Cabbage.—Spread a small head of cabbage into your kettle, put in a piece of butter the size of a small egg and a little water along with the cabbage. Do not get in too much water, just enough so it will not burn. Stir once in awhile. When done wet a small tablespoonful of flour in a small bowl, beat out lumps, add well beaten egg to this and fill bowl half full of cream and milk. Stir this into the hot cabbage and keep stirring until cooked, then add four or five tablespoonfuls of vinegar. Keep stirring so it won't curdle, add salt and pepper.

Carrot Fritters.—Scrape the carrots, cut them in halves crosswise, then cut each piece lengthwise into strips and boil until tender. Beat an egg until light, add a quarter teaspoonful of salt, half a cupful of milk and a scant half cupful of flour and beat until very smooth. Dip each piece of carrot in the batter, drop into deep, hot fat and fry to a delicate brown. Drain on soft paper, place on a heated platter and garnish with parsley.

Cauliflower Salad.—Cook cauliflower in salted water for half an hour until tender, but not quite done. Drain, cool, cut into sprigs and arrange neatly in salad bowl lined with lettuce leaves. Mash the yolks of four hard boiled eggs and cut the whites into petals. Arrange these like daisies over cauliflower and pour over it plain French dressing. Serve very cold.
