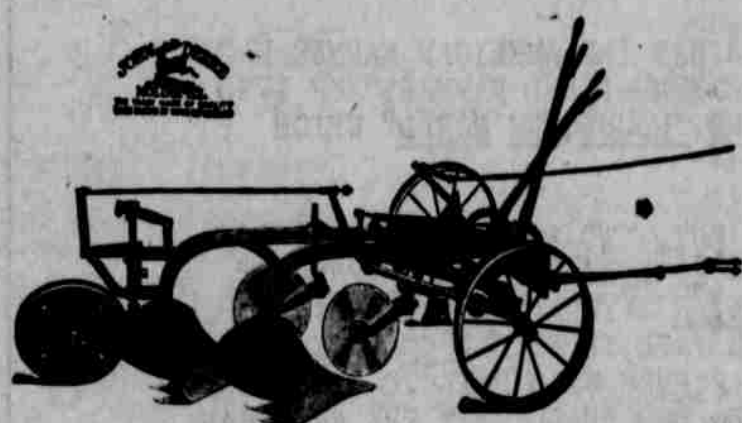

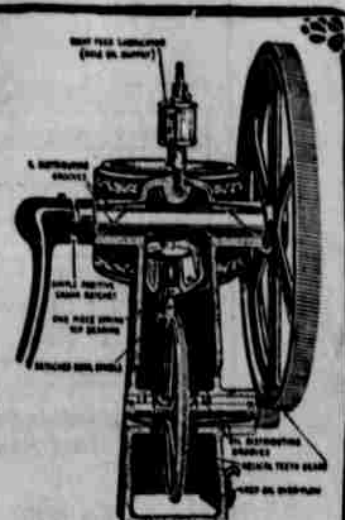

This year through an agreement with the Monmouth Herald its editor Mr. R. B. Swenson has very kindly consented to give us a page of space in the paper each week for publication of the Monmouth High School News.

This new arrangement, in addition to giving the patrons of the district the happenings at the High School, will also give several of the students a splendid opportunity to learn something of the typesetting and newspaper business. School opened October 1st with an enrollment of 87 students. In addition, there are four other students who are taking most of their work in the Normal. At the end of the first two weeks last year only 86 were enrolled, both regular and special.

The High School Library has been moved from the office to more spacious and attractive quarters in Room B. New reading tables and book cases have been procured, also about \$100.00 worth of new books are to come in, one half of the shipment having already arrived and is now being catalogued.

lege Quest and several others.

The magazines and newspapers are purchased through funds raised by levying a 25 cent tax on all students in attendance at the school.

The Library is in charge of a student committee with Miss Christine Halvorsen installed as Head Librarian.

Citizens and patrons of the district are always cordially invited to visit the reading room and make use of the books and periodicals on our shelves. The Library is open every school day from 9:00 to 4:00.

This week the High School is taking a census of the families in Monmouth as a part of its bit in the Hoover plan of National Food Conservation. A committee composed of Max Bowersox and Glen McNeil is doing the enumerating.
